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RULE 1000: GENERAL

1100 Name

The name of the organization is the Interscholastic Equestrian Association, Inc. (hereinafter referred to as "IEA.")

1300 Purpose

IEA is organized to promote and improve the quality of equestrian competition and instruction available to middle and secondary school students. Its purpose shall be to set minimum standards for competition, to provide information concerning the creation and development of school associated equestrian sport programs, to generally promote the common interests of safe riding instruction and competition, and to educate on matters related to equestrian competition at the middle and secondary school levels.

1400 Equal Opportunity

Though IEA shall serve all equine sport enthusiasts regardless of age, color, gender, race, religion, or national origin, the competitions it shall sponsor or sanction shall principally be for the benefit of riders who are in grades 6 through 12.

1500 Mission

The mission of the IEA is to introduce students in middle and secondary schools to equestrian sports and to develop understanding and appreciation of equestrian sports through organized competitions and educational opportunities.

1600 Goals

- To encourage recognition for middle and secondary school equestrians and to promote the equestrian as an athlete.
- To provide riders with organized competitive opportunities.
- To introduce new riders to equine sports.
- To promote the IEA among its constituencies.
- To provide riders with opportunities to further their education in equine sports and equine-related matters.
- To encourage liaison with other equestrian associations for the betterment of equestrian sports.
- To encourage a higher standard of coaching and instruction.
- To provide information concerning the creation and development of mounted and non-mounted equestrian programs.
- To establish and enforce IEA rules, standards and policies.
- To keep pace with the continuing progress of equestrian sports and to encourage good horsemanship.
- To generally promote the common interests of riding instruction and competition, and education on matters related to all segments of the horse industry.
- To develop team and individual sportsmanship.
- To establish a foundation to support the continuing mission of the IEA.

1700 Rules Interpretation and Application

These Rules and Regulations shall take precedence over all other rules and regulations of other similarly situated organizations. No IEA Zone may adopt rules inconsistent herewith. However, if a topic is not covered by these Rules and Regulations, first the rules and regulations of the Intercollegiate Horse Show Association ["IHSA"] and then, if not resolved, the United States Equestrian Federation, Inc. ["USEF"] for the Hunt Seat and Saddle Seat Disciplines and the American Quarter Horse Association ["AQHA"] and National Reining Horse Association ["NRHA"] for the Western Division may be used as a reference for guidance in making an equitable decision under the circumstances.

RULE 1000: GENERAL

1800 Use of Name & Logo

1801 The name, initials, logos, trademarks and other identifying material or information exclusively created by, created for, used by, or are the property of IEA, shall not be used by any person, club, team, company or entity without advance express written permission of IEA.

1802 At the discretion of the Executive Committee, violation of this rule may cause an IEA member to immediately forfeit all rights and privileges of membership for up to one year from the date of the violation.

1803 Furthermore, if a member violates this rule, IEA may, among other actions, file a lawsuit requesting temporary and/or permanent injunction orders from an appropriate court. If the IEA is successful, it may require the member to pay all reasonable attorney fees, litigation expenses and costs of the action and require the member to pay IEA for all profits received for breach of these rules.

1900 For all judicial procedures and time lines days will be counted as business days. Written documents will be accept via regular mail or email. Burden of proof for delivery / receipt is that of the sender.

RULE 2000: MEMBERSHIP

2100 Eligibility for Membership

2101 Membership in IEA shall be open to all individuals, teams, coaches and others interested in supporting equine sports at the middle and secondary school level and who enthusiastically support the goals and ideals of IEA. For teams and riders to participate in IEA competitions, shows and events, an IEA Coach Member must coach the team and all riders.

2102 Membership shall be on an annual basis beginning on July 1st and ending on June 30th of each year.

2103 IEA reserves the right for any reason to deny an application of any prospective member, even if that person or team was a member in any prior year.

2200 Membership Forms and Information

2201 Each IEA Member must make an annual application for membership to IEA by completing the prescribed application form, signing the waiver of liability form, and delivering the forms with the application fee to IEA. An application will only be accepted, the IEA membership granted to any class of member, and the member entitled to the benefits of IEA, including entering events, shows and competitions and being awarded points, only upon completion of ALL of the following: **(1) The Membership Packet, application, all required supporting documents, certificates, the inherently dangerous activity acknowledgment and waiver of liability form, and the fees must be received by IEA; and (2) The application is completely filled out with all requested information and appropriately signed by all required persons.**

2202 It is the responsibility of the applicant to assure timely delivery and completion of membership forms. **All paperwork must be processed and the member activated on the team's roster prior to entering any IEA show.**

2203 IEA is not required to validate the intended receipt of material, or to assure completion; only to accept materials as they are received.

2204 **Incomplete Membership Packets will not be processed** and may be returned to the applicant.

2205 If a parent or guardian desires to revoke the Waiver of Liability or Release, the revocation must be in writing and sent to the rider's coach and the Membership Secretary of IEA via certified mail. Effective immediately upon signing the revocation, the rider is no longer entitled to exercise any of the privileges of membership in IEA and cannot train for, travel to, or participate in any IEA event, show or competition. The coach must immediately contact via telephone the IEA Executive Director and give personal verbal notice of receiving the written revocation.

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2206 By making application for membership to IEA, each member, parent and legal guardian certifies that he/she has thoroughly read these Rules and Regulations, authorizes IEA to distribute the member's name, address, email address, and other available demographics to IEA sponsors, advertisers and other companies, activities, programs, and organizations, and authorizes IEA, its sponsors and publicists to use for promotional purposes all photographs taken at any IEA show or event.

2207 If a rider, coach, or team desires to revoke membership in the IEA, the revocation must be in writing and received by the Membership Secretary no later than November 15th. Effective immediately upon signing the revocation, the rider, coach, or team is no longer entitled to exercise any of the privileges of membership and may not participate in any IEA activities or competitions. While a rider, coach, or team may revoke membership at any time, **refunds of membership fees may only be granted prior to the November 15th membership application deadline.** No refunds will be granted to any rider, coach, or team who competed in one or more IEA shows.

2300 Classes of Membership

2301 Team Membership

2301.1 A Team consists of not less than three Rider members of the same team type (e.g. three Upper School Hunt Seat riders or three Middle School Western riders.)

2301.2 A Team must have an affiliated Coach Member.

2301.3 A Team must participate fully in the activities of the IEA, including participation in individual and/or team competitions in at least two IEA sanctioned shows per school year and subscribe to the Rules and Regulations of the IEA.

2301.4 No individual team member will be eligible to compete until a complete team membership packet has been received and processed by the IEA Membership Secretary. A complete team membership packet includes all of the following:

1. Team application and membership dues
2. Applications, waivers, and membership dues for three (3) riders
3. Coach application, waiver, membership dues, and proof of professional liability insurance.
4. Show application(s) for the one (1) hosting date or two (2) co-hosting dates (as defined in Rule 2302.)

2301.5 All Team and Rider applications must be received by November 15th. No additional Rider members may be added to the team roster after November 15th.

2301.6 An eligible Team must apply for membership annually on the official IEA Team Membership Form. An IEA Coach Member must sign this form. All Team membership applications must be timely filed with IEA and must include an annual membership fee as established by IEA.

2301.7 In order to remain a Team Member in good standing, the team coach must be an IEA Coach Member in good standing.

2301.8 To qualify as an IEA Team Member, the team, though desirable, is not required to have permission of, affiliation with, approval of or sponsorship by a middle or high school.

2301.9 If two or more IEA members and/or coach from the previous year form a team they are considered a returning team and must fulfill all hosting obligations as per Rule 2302.

2302 Hosting Obligation

2302.1 In the first year or part year of competition, a Team is not obligated to host / co-host an IEA competition.

RULE 2000: MEMBERSHIP

- 2302.2** In the second year of competition, a Team must co-host a minimum of one IEA competition.
- 2302.3** In the third year of competition and each year thereafter, a Team must co-host two (2) or host one (1) IEA regular season point show as the Event Host Coordinator (EHC) as defined in Rule 4200.
- 2302.4** Host / co-host dates must be submitted as part of the IEA Membership Packet. To ensure all Teams have an opportunity to successfully fulfill their hosting requirements, show date requests must be approved by the Zone Chair and any additional dates may not be granted until the Membership deadline has passed.
- 2302.5** The hosting and co-hosting responsibility must be fulfilled within each Team's designated Region.
- 2302.6** If an IEA Team fails to meet hosting / co-hosting requirements during the competition year, both the Team and all individual riders who competed as, who were associated with, or who were listed as a member of that IEA Team will not be eligible to compete at Regional, Zone and/or National Finals during that competition year. Furthermore, if a Team fails to meet hosting/co-hosting requirements during a competition year, both the Team and all its associated or listed riders will not be allowed to compete at any IEA show, competition or event in any subsequent competition years until they have hosted or co-hosted a competition.
- 2302.7** The Team must host or co-host each type of Team membership that is represented, e.g., a Team with a Hunt Seat Middle School Team and a Western Upper School Team must host both a Hunt Seat Middle School show and a Western Upper School show.
- 2302.8** In order to be eligible to host or co-host a show, a Team must have hosted a show previously, co-hosted with a Team who has hosted a show previously, or the show must be overseen by that Team's Zone Chair or Zone Chair's designee.
- 2302.9** A first-time show host may be approved without an experienced co-host if the Zone Chair assigns an IEA Show Supervisor for that competition (expenses to be covered by EHC). A Show Supervisor is an individual with three or more years of experience in the IEA as a coach member, board member, former board member, IHSA coach member or employee of the IEA and who is recommended by the Zone Chairman or the IEA Membership Office.
- 2302.10** **One team can be defined as the primary host (EHC) with up to two (2) co-host teams assisting.** Co-hosting is defined as equitable division of cost, reward, labor and services among not more than three (3) teams, as determined by the EHC. It is the responsibility of the co-hosts to *prearrange* a fair and equitable division of all costs, reward, labor and services. All co-host team names **must** be listed on the event insurance form, prize list and program for the show and the final show results report made to IEA to fulfill hosting / co-hosting requirements.

2303 Coach Membership

- 2303.1** Coach membership is open to any person at least twenty-one (21) years of age, associated with an IEA member Team, and covered by the coach's own professional liability insurance with minimum liability coverage of \$500,000 per accident. Proof of insurance, including the named coach and appropriate equestrian instruction language, must accompany the Coach Membership Form. A copy of the proof of renewal of insurance must be filed with IEA within thirty (30) days after the date of renewal. Until a Coach submits the proof (i.e. certificate) of insurance required by this rule, the Coach is not an IEA member.
- 2303.2** Only IEA Member Coaches are permitted to coach / teach / assist riders in the schooling area and at ringside.

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2303.3 Eligible coaches must apply for membership on and endorse the official IEA Coach Membership Application Form. All coach membership applications must be timely submitted to IEA with the annual membership fee as established by IEA. A coach may only be associated with two separate teams, but is only required to pay one coach membership fee for the membership year.

2303.4 In order to remain a Coach Member in good standing, the coach must ascribe to the Objectives of IEA, remain familiar with all IEA Rules and Regulation (and any amendments thereto), act professionally and respectfully at all IEA sanctioned shows, competitions and events, maintain current professional liability insurance, and follow all rules and regulations of the IEA, including but not limited to Rule 2300. If a coach resigns her/his position during the competition season, the new, substituting, IEA coach member must submit all necessary forms and payment as outlined in Rule 2301.4

2303.5 A Coach who has not timely complied with ALL rules of membership, responsibilities and duties of a Coach set forth in these Rules, is not a member in good standing and as a result:

1. The non-complying Coach will not be allowed to enter a team in any IEA event, show or competition;
2. No rider evaluated and coached by that non-complying Coach will be permitted to ride in any IEA event, show or competition; and
3. No points will be awarded to a team or rider with which the non-complying Coach is affiliated for any IEA event, show or competition.

If non-compliance is untimely discovered, at the discretion of the IEA Executive Committee, the coach's good standing may be revoked retroactively and all points accumulated for riders and teams may be not awarded.

2303.6 At least one IEA Coach or IEA Member Coach assistant of his/her team ["Responsible IEA Coach"] must attend and be present at all IEA sanctioned or approved events, shows and competitions at which the Responsible IEA Coach's rider(s) or team participates. The Responsible IEA Coach must be available at all reasonable times to the coach's riders during the IEA events, shows, and competitions. If the Responsible IEA Coach is not able to attend to all normal and reasonable anticipated coach's duties at the event, show or competition, then an alternate IEA Coach member must attend in place of and is required to fulfill the same duties and responsibilities of the Responsible IEA Coach. An alternate IEA Coach is defined as an IEA member coach of a different team. The alternate IEA Coach must in writing at the earliest opportunity notify the Event Host Coordinator and the Show Steward of this substitution. An alternate IEA Coach must have complied with all IEA rules and regulations.

2304 Rider Membership

2304.1 Any full-time student enrolled in grades six (6) through twelve (12) and less than twenty (20) years of age on September 1st of the year of the application is eligible to be a Rider Member. Middle school riders (Futures) shall be those students in grades six (6) through eight (8) and high school riders (Varsity and Junior Varsity) shall be those students in grades nine (9) through twelve (12).

2304.2 In order to participate in IEA shows, an IEA Coach Member must coach the rider.

2304.3 A rider having completed a secondary school program in mid-academic year is no longer eligible to ride in the upper school classes in regular point shows, but if otherwise qualified, may compete at that year's post-season finals shows.

2304.4 An eligible rider must apply for membership on the official IEA Rider Membership Application Form to be received by the Membership Office by November 15th. Rider application for membership must indicate and include payment for Hunt Seat, Western and/or Saddle Seat disciplines. **The rider and her/his custodial/supervising parent (or legally appointed**

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guardian) *must sign the rider application form and Waiver of Liability Form in the presence of the IEA Coach* before the form is submitted to IEA.

2304.5 The Coach Member must **personally verify** both the individual applicant's and the parent's/ guardian's signatures and identification on ALL rider applications and Waiver of Liability Forms. *Once a Rider's application is submitted to IEA, the IEA Coach is certifying to IEA the genuineness of all signatures on rider applicant and waiver forms.* The Coach Member shall retain and maintain copies for not less than three (3) years, and produce upon the request of any IEA official, all Team, Coach and Rider applications, current proof of professional liability insurance coverage, and Waiver of Liability Forms.

2304.6 It is the responsibility of the Coach Member to accurately assess the rider's ability, fill out and sign the rider membership form, and enter the rider in the proper class(es) according to her/his individual skill and experience level in compliance with the definitions and descriptions of those levels as set forth in these rules. [See Rules 2000 and 3000.]

2304.7 All rider applications, accompanied by the original executed Waiver of Liability Form, and fees must be timely submitted to IEA, as outlined in Rule 2200. An official IEA membership number will be issued to each member annually and must be available at all IEA competitions, shows, or events, and upon request presented to any IEA officer, director, show steward or show official.

2304.8 A rider member is not eligible to enter an IEA show until a membership number has been assigned and the membership has been activated for the current show season by the IEA Membership Office.

2304.9 Individuals or Coaches may not switch teams during the competition year. Under extenuating circumstances a petition may be filed with the IEA Membership Secretary who will send it to the Zone Chair and Zone Ethics Committee for a team change review. Should a petition be filed and granted then the following stipulations apply:

1. Riders must wait thirty (30) days before competing with the new team after the team change petition has been submitted to the IEA Membership Office.
2. Riders are not eligible to be designated as a point rider for the new team throughout the remainder of that competition season.
3. Riders may carry any individual points earned and the number of shows in which they competed to the new team.

2304.10 Individuals may be affiliated with only one IEA team per discipline. When competing in more than one discipline, individuals may join a different Hunt Seat, Western, and/or Saddle Seat team. Separate membership applications and separate membership fees must be submitted with each different team package.

2305 Contributing Membership

2305.1 Adult: This membership is open to adult individuals that are not participating in competitions as coaches, but who desire to be members of the association and to participate fully as members with regard to voting privileges and the right to hold office. A prospective adult contributing member will fill out an official "Contributing Membership Application," a signed waiver of liability, and submit dues annually to the association. Contributing Members must ascribe to the Objectives of IEA, remain familiar with all IEA Rules and Regulations (and any amendments thereto), act respectfully at all IEA sanctioned shows, competitions and events and follow all rules and regulations of the IEA.

2305.2 Junior: This membership is open to junior individuals that are not participating in competitions as riders, but who desire to be members of the association. Junior members do not have voting privileges, and they do not have the right to hold office, and junior contributing

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members are not eligible to ride at IEA competitions. Junior contributing members ARE eligible for non-mounted horsemanship and sportsmanship competitions within the IEA, and other potential member benefits. A prospective junior contributing member will fill out an official "Contributing Membership Application," a signed waiver of liability and submit dues annually to the association. Contributing Members must ascribe to the Objectives of IEA, remain familiar with all IEA Rules and Regulations (and any amendments thereto), act respectfully at all IEA sanctioned shows, competitions and events and follow all rules and regulations of the IEA.

2400 Riders with Disabilities or Special Needs

- 2401** A rider with disabilities is defined as one who cannot safely compete at the appropriate level of competition without special equipment or active assistance from one or more persons during the competition by reason of loss of one arm or one leg or loss of use of same; loss of or limitation of sight not correctable to 20/40 by corrective lenses; or loss of or limitation of hearing. Special equipment is any substitution of tack. Persons qualified for individual membership in IEA but who have a disability as defined herein may be permitted to compete under the terms and conditions described herein.
- 2402** Before becoming eligible to compete, the disabled person and his coach must both submit written statements requesting permission to compete and the nature and extent of the limitations, along with a full statement by the coach as to his/her evaluation of the ability of the rider. The statements must be submitted to the ~~Vice~~ President ~~Elect~~ of IEA.
- 2403** The ~~President-Elect~~ appropriate ~~Division Vice President~~ ["DVP"], or his/her designee, shall observe the rider on a horse, either in person at a mutually convenient location or via video, within thirty (30) days of the application, or if the application is received between April 1 – September 15, of the calendar year, by October 15. A videotape, unedited and recorded by a disinterested party, may be substituted for the ~~Vice~~ President ~~Elect's~~ on site observation. If, however, the ~~Vice~~ President-Elect is not satisfied with the tape, she/he may still request personal observation.
- 2404** The President-Elect shall determine whether the disabled person can safely compete in the class level for which the person is otherwise eligible under the Rules without active assistance. Active assistance is defined as physical assistance in the directing or control of the horse or verbal or sign assistance in the directing or control of the horse. If the President-Elect determines that the rider cannot safely compete, then the person shall have the right to a review by the full Board of Directors by requesting such a review in writing. The request shall state all facts the person believes to be pertinent and must include a statement signed by the person, or her/his parent if the person is under eighteen (18), agreeing with the decision of the Board. The Board's decisions shall be final and the prospective rider and parents will be bound by that determination.
- 2405** ~~In the event that the person~~ Once the rider is determined to be eligible to compete, ~~then the coach may then make entry for such person fourteen (14) days before the show noting that the coach must note any accommodations or the rider's special needs when submitting a show entry. is handicapped.~~ The EHC shall promptly notify the stable or person providing horses for the show of the nature and extent of the disabilities so that reasonable accommodations can be made.
- 2406** The provider of horses may, in her/his sole discretion, determine whether to permit the rider to compete on the provider's horses with or without special equipment. The provider's determination shall be final for that event only. The EHC should make every attempt to obtain the provider's determination before the day of the event in order to avoid inconveniencing the disabled person. If the EHC determines that none of the provider's horses can be ridden with the special equipment required for the rider, then the EHC must timely notify the coach and rider with disabilities.
- 2407** The stewards, the show committees, the stable providing facilities, the EHC and the persons providing horses for the show will evaluate riders having temporary physical disabilities on an individual basis as to suitability and safety.

2500 Membership Rights and Obligations

2501 Membership Rights

A member in good standing has a right to participate in IEA sanctioned, sponsored or promoted competitions, shows, activities and events, and receive other benefits of membership as determined by IEA. However, in order to remain a member in good standing, a member's annual dues must be paid in full, the member must submit annually information as required by IEA in the IEA Membership Packet, a member must not be indebted to the IEA except in the ordinary course of the IEA's operation, and shall not be in violation of any requirement set forth in these Rules and Regulations and shall not be suspended or expelled pursuant to Rule 2600.

2502 Membership Obligations

Each member of IEA agrees that she/he will abide by the Rules and Regulations of IEA (and any amendments thereto) and by all standing rules, policies and procedures set forth by IEA in its efforts to conduct the business consistent with IEA's mission and objectives. Current IEA issued and activated membership numbers for riders, coaches and teams must be available at all reasonable times during an IEA sanctioned event, show or competition, and must be timely shown to the Event Host Coordinator, Show Steward, Show Judge or IEA Official when requested.

2600 Membership Suspension and Expulsion

2601 Membership rights will be automatically suspended from the date that IEA is notified of non-payment of entry fees or that a member's check written for any purpose has not cleared their account until such date as the member makes payment to IEA by cash, certified check or money order as substitute payment and pays IEA \$25.00 as an administrative and returned check fee.

2602 Any Rider, Coach or Team member may be suspended or expelled from active participation in IEA for just cause as determined by the prevailing standards and rules of the IEA, which may, but need not, incorporate the standards and rules of other recognized equestrian associations, including but not limited to the USEF, AQHA, NRHA and IHSA. Expulsion of a member can also be determined by a vote of at least two-thirds (2/3) of the Board of Directors, excluding the offending member. In all such cases, a written notice shall be given to the member in question ten (10) days in advance of such meeting, stating the charges and inviting the member to attend and be heard at such meeting. Should the member desire to appear and be heard at such meeting, she/he shall indicate such desire in writing to the IEA Board Chair, at least forty-eight (48) hours in advance of the meeting date. The Board of Directors shall determine the suspension and/or sanctions, if appropriate.

2603 The falsification of any membership, show, eligibility, insurance information, application, waiver of liability, placement or any other document or form required by IEA, Event Host Coordinator or a host facility, may be cause for immediate expulsion of the rider, coach, and/or Team from IEA, the IEA sanctioned event and any other penalty assigned by the Zone Ethics Committee, the IEA National Steward or the IEA Executive Committee.

2700 Board of Directors and Executive Committee

2701 Board of Directors

The Board of Directors will consist of as few as twelve (12), or as many as twenty (20), members (Zone Chairs, Founding Members & At-Large Members) as indicated in the By-Laws. Initially there will be three groups of Zone Chairs elected to the Board, which will serve staggered terms starting July 1, 2007: 1st group: zones 1, 4, 7, 10 (two years); 2nd group: zones 2, 5, 8, 11 (three years); and 3rd group: zones 3, 6, 9, 12 (one year). After each group serves its initial term starting on July 1, 2007, the zone board member will thereafter be elected to a three-year term. If the Zone is not active or no nominations are received from the Zone, the Executive Committee (defined below) can appoint from the Zone an interested qualified IEA Member to serve the term for that zone. If a Zone Chair or Director during his/her term withdraws or is no longer able or available to actively serve his/her complete term on the Board of Directors, the Executive Committee will appoint an interested qualified IEA Member to serve the remaining term. The National Steward shall be a non-voting ad hoc member of the Board.

2702 Executive Committee

The Executive Committee of IEA will consist of the President, President-Elect, Secretary, Treasurer and the Founding Board Members (or their designees). The Board of Directors will elect the officers of the organization annually as set forth in the By-Laws. Officers may be elected from any adult member of IEA or the Founding Members. The Executive Committee will be charged with the responsibility for operations of IEA, and will hire and fire all other IEA support staff it chooses to retain including, if appropriate, an Executive Director, Chief Operating Officer, Marketing Director, Nationals Finals Coordinator and Membership Secretary, and it will determine the salaries to be paid for all positions. The Executive Director will report directly to the Executive Committee and perform the assigned operational duties for the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee will also appoint the National Steward and all members of the various committees created for operation or function of IEA. The Executive Committee will also determine and set the amount that will be charged for each category of IEA membership.

2800 Zone Organization and Governance

2801 Zones

2801.1 IEA membership and competitions will be divided into zones.

2801.2 For zones with less than three (3) active teams, refer to Rules 8504.2 and 8505.2.

2801.3 Refer to USEF Article 917 for a zone map. The following is a list of the zones and the states which comprise each zone:

- Zone 1: Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island
- Zone 2: New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania
- Zone 3: Delaware, Maryland, West Virginia, Virginia, North Carolina
- Zone 4: Tennessee, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi
- Zone 5: Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan
- Zone 6: Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska
- Zone 7: Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana
- Zone 8: Utah, Colorado, Arizona, New Mexico
- Zone 9: Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, Alaska
- Zone 10: California, Nevada, Hawaii
- Zone 11: Hawaii
- Zone 12: Alaska

2802 Election of Zone Chairs

2802.1 A Zone will consist of one or more Regions as determined annually by the Board of Directors.

2802.2 Other than Founding Members (Roxane Lawrence, Ollie Griffith, Wayne Ackerer, Timothy Boone and Myron Leff, or their respective designee), to “qualify” as a Zone Chair or a Member of the Board of Directors one must be (a) a Coach, Alumni or Contributing IEA Member in the year serving on, appointed to and/or elected to the Board of Directors, (b) at least the age of 21 when elected or appointed, and (c) if a Zone Chair, be a resident of the Zone he/she represents.

2802.3 The adult IEA members in each active Zone will elect a Zone Chair. Each active Zone will have one seat on the Board of Directors. ~~An “active Zone” is defined as having at least one IEA Team or one IEA Coach in the Zone.~~ The Zone Chair will represent all disciplines, coaches and riders in their respective Zone on the Board of Directors. The Zone Chair will also be responsible for organizing and supervising the Zone’s operations, the Regional competitions (if required) and the Zone Finals competition.

2802.4 At a meeting of each active Zone, or by some other fair and reasonable method, the qualified adult IEA members in the Zone will nominate members for the position of Zone Chair. Any adult IEA Member can self nominate himself or herself for the position as Zone Chair. The

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nominations for Zone Chair must be submitted to the IEA Membership Secretary by April 30th each year and if there is more than one nomination for a Zone Chair, a vote of all adult Zone resident members will be conducted by IEA no later than June 15th. The adult IEA members in the Zone will vote for the position of Zone Chair on the official ballot that is emailed or mailed by the Membership Secretary. The IEA Member must endorse the ballot, and the ballot must be returned to and received by the IEA Membership Secretary by the deadline date set by IEA. There will be one vote per IEA adult Member.

2803 Regional Split Guidelines - General Rules for Dividing Zone into Regions

2803.1 If the coach members of a Zone determine that there are too many teams or rider members in a zone (or region) to equitably allow competition, then the Zone Chair (with the advice and majority consent of the coach members of that Zone) may present to the Executive Committee a proposal detailing how the zone should be divided into one or more regions, taking into consideration such factors as facilities, horses, traveling distance, size of teams, etc. This proposal must include information as to which disciplines will be divided. The number of individual participants in every class and teams advancing to Zones will be twelve (12) unless otherwise petitioned and approved. The proposal must be submitted in writing to the IEA Membership Secretary no later than June 15th. Once a Zone reaches fifteen (15) teams, a mandatory review to split is required the following year. The Zone Chair must submit a proposal using the Regional Split Guidelines in writing to the IEA Membership Secretary no later than June 15th per Regional Split Guidelines.

2803.2 Each discipline should be considered separately when planning regions.

2803.3 A region should have at least three (3) teams to exist and should have no more than fifteen (15) teams initially assigned.

2803.4 Teams should be assigned to a region based on geographic proximity, number of riders, and facility/horse resources in that order of priority. Teams should be assigned to a region within the zone by September 1st of each year.

2803.5 Futures teams that exist without an upper school team are to be assigned a region also. Futures teams that are a part of an upper school team should remain in the same region as their upper school team.

2803.6 All teams that join after the initial regional assignments are to be added into a region based on their geographic proximity, number of riders, and facility/horse resources.

2803.7 A region that has more than fifteen (15) teams by National Finals ought to split the following IEA competition year.

2803.8 A region that was established but has less than three (3) teams register by November 15th should be absorbed back into existing regions.

2803.9 Each region may elect a regional chairperson.

2803.10 Teams hosting shows may include a priority entry period for their region, or may limit all entries only to their region, or open the entries to the Zone at large. This priority entry period must be stated in the prize list.

2803.11 Host / co-host requirements must be fulfilled within a team's own designated region.

2803.12 Regional Split guidelines ideally include dates for post season competitions. If those dates are not included in the Regional Split guidelines they must be submitted to the Membership Office by September 15th.

2900 Presenting Matters to IEA and Indemnification

2901 Any IEA member has the right to bring matters concerning the functioning of the IEA to the attention of the Board of Directors by submitting a request in writing to the attention of the Zone Chair.

Members who have general concerns, compliments or suggestions for the IEA should present the matter to their coach, who then should contact their Zone Chair. The Zone Chair can then bring the matter to the attention of the IEA Board of Directors.

Only coach members may file formal petitions, appeals and protests on behalf of their teams or individual riders.

Any matter that concerns the safety of horses and riders, or the ethics of coaches or riders shall be considered an urgent matter and shall be dealt with immediately by the Show Steward, and such determination and decision will be final during the show.

2902 By making application to, becoming a member of IEA, or competing in any IEA sanctioned event, competition or show, all IEA Members, and the parents, next friend and legal guardians of the Rider Members, agree not to sue, not to bring any claim against, and to indemnify and hold harmless IEA, its officers, directors, members, National Steward, zone chair, employees, show officials, judges, stewards, agents, representatives and assigns against all threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Action") arising by reason of or from injury, death, or damages of any kind that occurs at, traveling to, around, or near, or training and preparing for, any IEA approved or sanctioned competition, show or event. Litigation expenses, attorney fees and costs incurred in defending an Action may be paid by the IEA in advance, however, the responsible Team, Coach, parents, legal guardians and member shall reimburse IEA for said expenses, fees and costs.

2903 All IEA members acknowledge and agree, as condition to membership in IEA, that if litigation is initiated or filed by IEA against a member, or is initiated or filed by a member (or the parents, next friend or legal guardian of a member) against IEA, its officers, directors, members, zone chairs, agents or representatives, the member waives all defenses and claims relating to jurisdiction and venue, and consents to such litigation being filed in, or removed to, an appropriate state or federal court located in Columbus, Ohio.

2904 *IEA does not take responsibility for, endorse or make any representations regarding the competency, education, training, ability or background of any member, including Coaches.* Furthermore, IEA cannot and does not evaluate or vouch for the background or quality of any Coach, horse, riding facility, equipment, tack or stables. **Riding horses and being around such animals is an unpredictable, inherently risky, and intrinsically dangerous activity.** Therefore, *all members and parents/guardians should, and must, make their own evaluation and decision of the associated risks and dangers before becoming a member, or granting permissions for a minor to become a member, of IEA and competing at IEA shows, competitions, and events.*

Rule 3000: DISCIPLINES, CLASSES AND TESTS: RIDER PLACEMENT AND ELIGIBILITY

3100 General - All Disciplines

There shall be three disciplines: Hunt Seat, Western, and Saddle Seat. Except where special rules only apply to a particular discipline, all rules apply to all riders and coaches in all disciplines.

3101 Definitions:

3101.1 Recognized competitions - A recognized competition is any sanctioned by the United States Equestrian Federation (USEF); American Grand Prix Association (AGA); American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA); National Reining Horse Association (NRHA); American Paint Horse Association (APHA); Appaloosa Horse Club (ApHC); Pinto Horse Association (PtHA); and United States Eventing Association (USEA). ~~4-H state and regional competitions will be recognized for Western Horsemanship only.~~

Rule 3000: DISCIPLINES, CLASSES AND TESTS: RIDER PLACEMENT AND ELIGIBILITY

3101.2 Open Competitions - Local horse show series, 4-H state and regional competitions, or any competitions that do not keep permanent point records are considered open competitions.

3101.3 Instruction - Any number of lessons taken within a week (Monday-Sunday) constitutes a week of instruction.

3101.4 Hunt Seat Equitation Classes - A Hunt Seat equitation class is any class that is judged on Hunt Seat equitation specifically.

3200 Rider Classification and Class Eligibility

3201 Riders shall be classified in accordance with guidelines established by the IEA Rules. The team coach will be responsible for assigning the rider to the appropriate division and class within the discipline, based upon the following descriptions (Rules 3300-3500). The rider's total riding experience, not just riding experience with IEA shows, must be considered for class designations as per Rule 3000. If a rider has progressed sufficiently in skills, the coach may also voluntarily move her/him to a higher class. These class descriptions are designed to aid in initially placing new members, and should be used to support, but not override mandatory class advancement. **Along with the mandatory advancement rules, riders must be evaluated each year according to class description levels prior to submitting membership application.** Competing in two different levels is permitted only when a rider points-out on the flat (Hunt Seat), horsemanship (Western) or performance (Saddle Seat).

3202 Initial Placements

3202.1 Initial placement of Hunt Seat riders should be based upon their over fences class eligibility. A Hunt Seat rider may not be initially placed in a lower division designation in the flat classes than the over fences classes.

3202.2 Initial placement of Western riders should be based upon their horsemanship class eligibility. A Western rider may not be initially placed in a lower division designation in the reining classes than the horsemanship classes.

3202.3 Initial placement of Saddle Seat riders should be based upon their performance class eligibility. A Saddle Seat rider may not be initially placed in a lower division designation in the workout classes than the performance classes.

3202.4 Cross Over Riders

Riders competing in multiple disciplines should be placed at least one division lower in the crossover discipline than their primary discipline placement. Open or Intermediate Western riders with no prior jumping experience shall be placed no lower than the Hunt Seat Novice Equitation o/f x-rails class. Open or Intermediate Hunt seat riders with no prior reining experience shall be placed no lower than the Western Novice Horsemanship class. ~~A rider that competes in more than one discipline should be placed based on their skills and experience in each discipline. Initial placement should be separately assessed for each discipline.~~

3202.5 Riders crossing over into the Western discipline should have a minimum of one-year of professional instruction in reining before competing in an Open or Intermediate level reining class.

3202.6 Riders crossing over into the Hunt Seat discipline should have a minimum of one-year professional instruction over fences before competing in an Open, Intermediate, or Novice level jumping class.

Rule 3000: DISCIPLINES, CLASSES AND TESTS: RIDER PLACEMENT AND ELIGIBILITY

- 3203** Once a rider has competed in a division, the rider may not move to a lower level division unless directed to do so by the IEA National Steward. No rider who has competed successfully in at least two IEA sanctioned shows in a specific division will be permitted to ride in a lower level division, unless he/she provides proof of diminished riding ability.
- 3204** To be eligible for post season finals in the individual or team classes, a rider must show in a minimum of two (2) IEA shows during the regular season. Hunt Seat and Western riders may not show in more than five (5) regular season point shows per class per year. To be eligible for Year-End Saddle Seat Awards, Saddle Seat riders must have competed in a minimum of one (1) and not more than eight (8) regular season point shows.
- 3205** Under the following conditions, a rider will be required to advance to the next higher division in order to compete in an IEA sanctioned event, show or competition and have those points count. IEA will track separately the points accumulated by a rider in flat and fences, horsemanship and reining, or performance and workout classes as applicable.
- 3205.1** Riders may not compete in the same division for more than two (2) show seasons. Coaches may file a petition as per rule 9000 if there is a valid reason why a rider should continue to ride in the lower division.
- 3205.2** Beginning in the 2013-2014 season, if a rider accumulates ~~twenty (20)~~ twenty-two (22) points in a class in any single competition year, that rider points out and must, during the next competition year, move up at least one division in order to be eligible to ride in any IEA show.
- 3205.3** Competing in two different divisions is permitted only when a rider points-out on the flat (Hunt Seat), horsemanship (Western) or performance (Saddle Seat). For purposes of this rule, only rider points awarded during a single competition year will be accumulated. No rider points will be carried over from one year to the next.
- 3205.4** Any rider who has qualified or shown as an individual rider in a given class in their division for the previous season's National Finals must advance to the next division the following season. Riders selected to compete in team classes at the National Finals who do not meet any of the other advancement criteria are not required to advance to the next division the following season.
- 3205.5** Riders who advance over fences, reining or workout through voluntary advancement, two-year participation, pointing-out, or qualifying for Nationals must also advance on the flat, horsemanship or performance (*i.e. - a rider may compete in VO flat and VI over fences but may not compete in VO over fences and VI flat // a rider may compete in VO horsemanship and VI reining but may not compete in VO reining and VI horsemanship*).
- 3205.6** All middle school riders (Futures) graduating to upper school competition (Varsity/Junior Varsity) should be reevaluated as "initial placements" and assigned the appropriate class(es).
- 3205.7** Individual and Team points will be posted on the IEA website. **Points become final after they have been posted for 21 days barring a ruling by the ZEC or National Steward.** Coaches are responsible for verifying points and must immediately notify the IEA Membership Office of any discrepancies.
- 3206** When the ability of a rider is called into question, the chief show steward at the rider's next competition (or if during a show, that chief show steward) will review the rider's ability for proper division placement.

Rule 3000: DISCIPLINES, CLASSES AND TESTS: RIDER PLACEMENT AND ELIGIBILITY

3300 HUNT SEAT DISCIPLINE

3301 Hunt Seat Over Fences Classes

CLASS 1. Varsity Open Equitation o/f 2'6" – Riders should be capable of jumping 3'-3'6" on their usual mounts at home. Riders may have shown in any horse show, recognized or unrecognized, at 3'3" or above. Coaches should be confident these riders could safely perform over a 2'6" Hunter or equitation course on an unfamiliar horse. Riders participating in Varsity Open Over Fences are expected to compete throughout the season in Varsity Open Flat. To be eligible for post season competitions (individual or team) riders must have accumulated the required points and participated in a minimum of two (2) Varsity Open Flat classes during the regular season.

CLASS 2. Varsity Intermediate Equitation o/f 2' – Riders should be capable of jumping 2'6"-3' on their usual mounts at home. Intermediate Riders may have shown in any horse show, recognized or unrecognized, at 3' or below. Riders who have won 10 or more blue ribbons at 3' must be placed in Varsity Open O/F. Coaches should be confident these riders would be able to safely perform over 2' Hunter or equitation course on an unfamiliar horse. Riders participating in Varsity Intermediate Over Fences are expected to compete throughout the season in Varsity Intermediate or Varsity Open Flat. To be eligible for post season competitions (individual or team) riders must have accumulated the required points and participated in a minimum of two (2) Varsity Intermediate or Varsity Open Flat classes during the regular season.

CLASS 3. Junior Varsity Novice Equitation o/f x-rails – Riders should be capable of jumping 2'-2'6" on their usual mounts at home. Junior Varsity Novice Riders may have shown in any horse show, recognized or unrecognized, at 2'6" or below. Riders who have won 10 or more blue ribbons at 2'6" must be placed in the next higher appropriate level. Riders should have a minimum of one-year of professional instruction over fences. Coaches should be confident these riders would be able to safely perform over an x-rails Hunter or equitation course on an unfamiliar horse. Riders participating in Junior Varsity Novice Over Fences are expected to compete throughout the season in Junior Varsity Novice or Varsity Intermediate Flat. To be eligible for post season competitions (individual or team) riders must have accumulated the required points and participated in a minimum of two (2) Junior Varsity Novice or Varsity Intermediate Flat classes during the regular season.

CLASS 4. Future Intermediate Equitation o/f 2' – Restricted to middle school riders who meet the criteria for Hunt Seat Class 2. Riders participating in Future Intermediate Over Fences are expected to compete throughout the season in Future Intermediate Flat. To be eligible for post season competitions (individual or team) riders must have accumulated the required points and participated in a minimum of two (2) Future Intermediate Flat classes during the regular season.

CLASS 5. Future Novice o/f x-rails - Restricted to middle school riders who meet the criteria for Hunt Seat Class 3. Riders participating in Future Novice Over Fences are expected to compete throughout the season in Future Novice or Future Intermediate Flat. To be eligible for post season competitions (individual or team) riders must have accumulated the required points and participated in a minimum of two (2) Future Novice or Future Intermediate Flat classes during the regular season.

3302 Hunt Seat Flat Classes

Riders without jumping experience should be assessed according to their ability to perform flatwork tests, as listed in Rule 3305.

CLASS 6. Varsity Open Equitation on the flat – These riders should be capable of performing Hunt Seat Tests 1 through 13.

CLASS 7. Varsity Intermediate Equitation on the flat – These riders should be capable of performing Hunt Seat Tests 1 through 9.

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3300 HUNT SEAT DISCIPLINE

CLASS 8. **Junior Varsity Novice Equitation on the flat** – These riders should be capable of performing Hunt Seat Tests 1 through 8.

CLASS 9. **Junior Varsity Beginner Equitation on the flat Walk/Trot/Canter** – Open to riders who are not eligible for Novice level jumping classes, but should be experienced enough to canter an unfamiliar animal in a group. These riders should be capable of performing Hunt Seat Tests 1 through 7. A Beginner rider may not have shown over fences larger than 2' in any horse show. To be eligible for Class 9, a rider must have had at least one year continuous professional instruction, must demonstrate proficiency at the trot and canter, and be capable of competing on a variety of unfamiliar horses. A Walk/Trot class is an optional offering and is open only to those riders competing in the Walk/Trot/Canter class. Entry fees will be collected but no individual or team points will be awarded. The intent is not to accommodate lower level riders. Competitors in W/T must meet eligibility requirements of Hunt Seat Class 9 and must compete in the W/T/C class.

CLASS 9. **Walk/Trot/Canter**

CLASS 9x. **Walk/Trot** (optional offering and does not count for points) Open only to those riders who are riding in Class 9-W/T/C

CLASS 10. **Future Intermediate Equitation on the flat** – Restricted to middle school riders who are capable of performing Hunt Seat Tests 1 through 9.

CLASS 11. **Future Novice Equitation on the flat** – Restricted to middle school riders who are capable of performing Hunt Seat Tests 1 through 8.

CLASS 12. **Future Beginner Equitation on the flat Walk/Trot/Canter** – Restricted to middle school riders who meet the eligibility requirements of Class 9.

CLASS 12. **Walk/Trot/Canter**

CLASS 12x. **Walk/Trot** (optional offering and does not count for points) Open only to those riders who are riding in Class 12 - W/T/C

3304 Hunt Seat Championship Class

Varsity Open Championship Class – The top Varsity Open riders as determined by points and places within the show are eligible for this class. The class requires a minimum of six (6) riders, and should be limited to the top ten (10). Riders must be eligible to complete in Varsity Open Over Fences (2'6") to be eligible for this championship class. The class may be run using the same mount for both phases of the competition, or a separate draw may be done for each phase. The judge may choose to implement any additional testing after the completion of the two mandatory phases. Phase 1 – Riders will be judged over an advanced equitation course with jumps from 2'6" to 3'. Hunt Seat tests 1-13 may be asked. Phase 2 – Riders will also compete on the Flat and may be asked to perform any of tests 1-11.

3305 Hunt Seat Rider Tests

A rider must be prepared to perform the test appropriate for the class in which the rider is participating. Riders may be requested to perform the following tests collectively or individually during a show or competition. No other tests may be used. The judge may choose only from the following list, and instructions for performance of the test must be publicly announced.

1. Asked an appropriate horsemanship question that is tailored to the rider's ability level.
2. Halt
3. Sitting trot.
4. Two point position at the walk and/or trot.
5. Figure eight at trot, demonstrating change of diagonals.
6. Figure eight at canter on correct lead, demonstrating simple change of lead.
7. Change Horses
8. Ride without stirrups.

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3300 HUNT SEAT DISCIPLINE

9. Change leads down center of ring, demonstrating simple change of lead.
10. Canter on the counter lead. No more than eight horses may counter canter at one time.
11. Half-turn on forehand and/or half-turn on haunches.
12. Jump a shortened course.
13. Trot a jump not to exceed 2'6".

3400 WESTERN DISCIPLINE

3401 Horsemanship Classes

CLASS 1. Varsity Open Horsemanship: ~~Riders who have competed at nationally qualifying competitions such as, but not limited to, youth team or world show qualifying competitions. Also, riders who have won NRHA or AQHA world top 5 placing or any rider with a top 5 placing at the All American Quarter Horse Congress, Paint, Appaloosa, and other breed show equivalents. Showmanship, halter, Hunt Seat, and contest classes are excluded.~~ Riders who have finished in the top ten in a nationally recognized breed or world show competition (QH Congress, AQHA, NRHA, APHA, ApHC, PtHA) in a western mounted class; and/or riders who finished in the top two year-end standings in a recognized state breed association or top ten national ranking for year end results. This excludes games, halter, showmanship, walk trot, and 10 & under. These riders should be capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1-10.

CLASS 2. Varsity Intermediate Horsemanship: ~~These riders are those who have won 5 or more blue ribbons in Western horsemanship or reining in breed or National Reining Horse associations, for example: Quarter Horse, Paint, and Appaloosa and NRHA shows.~~ Riders who have won **five (5) or more** blue ribbons in western mounted classes at nationally recognized breed association competitions, (i.e. AQHA, APHA, NRHA, ApHC, PtHA) OR have earned **twenty-two (22) or more** total points from a breed association in western classes (including novice divisions) excluding halter, showmanship, games, walk-trot, and 10 & under. These riders should be capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1-8.

CLASS 3. Junior Varsity Novice Horsemanship: ~~These riders may have shown at open shows and non-breed specific shows, for example, 4H events and county fairs.~~ Riders who have shown at more than eight (8) open shows or county fairs and have not won five (5) blue ribbons in a western mounted class at a nationally recognized breed association show. (i.e. AQHA, APHA, NRHA, ApHC, PtHA) These riders have earned **less than twenty-two (22)** total points in any breed association in western classes (including novice divisions). This excludes halter, showmanship, games, walk-trot, and 10 & under. These riders should be capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1-6.

CLASS 4 Junior Varsity Beginner Horsemanship: Open to riders who are not eligible for Novice level classes, but should be experienced enough to walk, jog and lope an unfamiliar animal in a group. These riders should be capable of performing Western tests 1-6 and may have participated in camp shows and in-house farm shows. Riders may not have shown at a lope in more than **five (5) eight (8)** open shows (i.e. 4H events and county fairs) and non-breed specific shows. **IEA experience at the Beginner level in a different discipline does not count.** To be eligible for class 4, riders must have at least one year continuous professional instruction, must demonstrate proficiency at a jog and lope, and must be capable of competing on a variety of unfamiliar horses. A Walk/Jog class is an optional offering and is open only to those riders competing in the Walk/Jog/Lope class. Entry fees will be collected but no individual or team points will be awarded. The intent is not to accommodate lower level riders. Competitors in W/J must meet eligibility requirements of Western Class 4 and must compete in the W/J/L class.

CLASS 4. Walk/Jog/Lope

CLASS 4x. Walk/Jog (optional offering and does not count for points) Open only to those riders who are riding in Class 4 - W/J/L.

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3400 WESTERN DISCIPLINE

CLASS 5. Future Intermediate Horsemanship: Restricted to middle school riders who meet the criteria for Western Horsemanship Class 2 and/or are capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1-8.

CLASS 6. Future Novice Horsemanship: Restricted to middle school riders who meet the criteria for Western Horsemanship Class 3 and/or who are capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1-6.

CLASS 7. Future Beginner Horsemanship: Restricted to middle school riders who meet the criteria for Western Horsemanship Class 4. These riders should be capable of performing Western Horsemanship tests 1-6.

CLASS 7. Walk/Jog/Lope

CLASS 7x. Walk/Jog (optional offering and does not count for points) Open only to those riders who are riding in Class 7 - W/J/L.

3402 Reining Classes

CLASS 8. Varsity Open Reining: Restricted to those riders competing in the Varsity Open Horsemanship. Riders participating in Varsity Open Reining are expected to compete throughout the season in Varsity Open Horsemanship. To be eligible for post season competitions (individual or team) riders must have accumulated the required points and participated in a minimum of two (2) Varsity Open Horsemanship classes during the regular season. Riders should have a minimum of one-year professional reining instruction.

CLASS 9. Varsity Intermediate Reining: Restricted to riders competing in Varsity Intermediate or Varsity Open Horsemanship. Riders participating in Varsity Intermediate Reining are expected to compete throughout the season in Varsity Intermediate or Varsity Open Horsemanship. To be eligible for post season competitions (individual or team) riders must have accumulated the required points and participated in a minimum of two (2) Varsity Intermediate or Varsity Open Horsemanship classes during the regular season. Riders should have a minimum of one-year professional reining instruction.

CLASS 10. Futures Intermediate Reining: Restricted to riders competing in the Futures Intermediate Horsemanship Class. Riders participating in Future Intermediate Reining are expected to compete throughout the season in Future Intermediate Horsemanship. To be eligible for post season competitions (individual or team) riders must have accumulated the required points and participated in a minimum of two (2) Future Intermediate Horsemanship classes during the regular season. Riders should have a minimum of one-year professional reining instruction.

3403 Championship Western Award

This is an award issued to the high point rider based on the total of the Varsity Open Horsemanship and Varsity Open Reining points. In case of a tie, the judge(s) may require a ride off, the type of which to be determined by each judge.

3404 Western Horsemanship Tests

A Western judge may choose from the following horsemanship tests. Any one or combination of appropriate or equivalent tests may be used.

1. Ask an appropriate horsemanship question that is tailored to the rider's ability level.
2. Individual performance on the rail.
3. Halt and/or back
4. Figure eight at the jog
5. Change horses
6. Lope on specific lead and stop
7. 360 degree turn
8. Figure eight at the lope, demonstrating a change of lead (through the walk or jog)

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3400 WESTERN DISCIPLINE

9. Ride without stirrups
10. Simple change of leads in a straight line

3500 SADDLE SEAT DISCIPLINE

3501 PERFORMANCE CLASSES

CLASS 1. Varsity Open Equitation: Open to riders in grades 9-12. Riders will show at a walk, trot and canter, and should be capable of performing tests 1-15. Eligible riders for this division will meet any of the described criteria:

- Riders that are successfully competing regularly in "A" rated shows or breed equivalent shows in the 14-17 sections of Open Equitation and/or Performance Divisions.
- Riders that are no longer eligible as Limit, Novice or Maiden per USEF rule EQ119.
- Any rider that has won a champion or reserve champion in a regular equitation or performance division at an "A" rated show in 14-17 age groups.
- Riders who have qualified or competed in Pleasure Equitation 14-17 at a National Finals event.
- Any rider that has qualified or competed in National and/or World Level competitions in Equitation or Performance (walk, trot, canter) at USEF or breed-specific Finals for ages 14-17 ("Senior Equitation")
- Any Upper School rider that has qualified or competed in any National or World Equitation Final that is open to riders 17 & under (examples: USEF Saddle Seat Medal Finals / "Good Hands" Championship)

CLASS 2. Varsity Intermediate Equitation: Open to riders in grades 9-12. Riders will show at walk, trot and canter, and they should be capable of performing tests 1-12. Eligible riders for this division will meet any of the described criteria:

- Riders that have competed at a horse show wearing a full habit when showing at a walk, trot, and canter
- Riders who are eligible as Limit, Novice or Maiden riders per USEF rule EQ119
- Riders that are showing in regular equitation or any performance division at "A" or "B" rated shows, but have not shown or qualified in any National or World Level Finals for ages 14-17 ("Senior Equitation")
- Riders that are showing in Pleasure Equitation at "A" rated shows, but have not shown or qualified for any National or World Level Final in Pleasure Equitation for ages 14-17.
- Riders who have qualified and/or shown at any National and/or World Level competitions in Equitation or Performance (walk, trot, canter) at USEF or breed-specific Finals for ages 13 & Under ("Junior Equitation")
- Any upper school rider that has qualified or competed in any National or World Equitation Final that is open to riders 17 & under (example: USEF Saddle Seat Medal Finals / "Good Hands" Championship).

CLASS 3. Junior Varsity Novice Equitation: Open to riders in grades 9-12. Riders will show at the walk, trot and canter and these riders should be capable of performing tests 1-7. Eligible riders for this division will meet any of the described criteria:

- Riders may have shown in Saddle Seat equitation at unrated shows, county fairs, local shows, 4-H, non breed-specific shows and other similar shows in the walk-trot-canter classes.
- Academy Riders that have shown Walk-Trot-Canter

CLASS 4. Junior Varsity Beginner Equitation-Walk/Trot: Open to riders in grades 9-12. Riders should be capable of performing tests 1-7; however, these riders will only perform at the walk and trot. (Referenced tests and patterns will only be performed at the walk and trot. Canter will not be called for or judged in any beginner classes.) Eligible riders for this division must have at least one year continuous instruction and must be able to walk, trot and canter on an unfamiliar mount. Riders will also meet any of the described criteria:

- Riders with NO formal show experience
- Riders that have only shown at unrated shows

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- Any Academy Rider that has shown Walk and Trot ONLY, but is able to canter
- Riders who have competed only in Walk-Trot in rated shows (Regional, National, or World championships), but are able to canter

An additional non-pointed performance class on the rail at the Walk/Trot (class 4x) is an optional offering and is open only to those riders competing in the pointed performance class at the Walk/Trot (class 4). Entry fees will be collected but no individual or team points will be awarded. The intent is not to accommodate lower level riders. Competitors in 4x must meet eligibility requirements of Junior Varsity Beginner Equitation-Walk/Trot and must compete in W/T class 4.

4. Walk/Trot (additional testing at the W/T is allowed)

4x. Walk/Trot (optional offering, **no additional testing allowed**, and does not count for points) Open only to those riders who are riding in Class 4-W/T

CLASS 5. Future Intermediate Equitation: Open to riders in grades 6-8. Riders will show at walk, trot and canter, and they should be capable of performing tests 1-12. Eligible riders for this division will meet any of the described criteria:

-Riders that have competed at a horse show wearing a full habit when showing at a walk, trot, and canter

-Riders who are eligible as Limit, Novice or Maiden riders per USEF rule EQ119

-Riders that are showing in regular equitation or any performance division at "A" or "B" rated shows, but have not shown or qualified in any National or World Level Finals for ages 14-17 ("Senior Equitation")

-Riders that are showing in Pleasure Equitation at "A" rated shows, but have not shown or qualified for any National or World Level Final in Pleasure Equitation for ages 14-17.

-Riders who have qualified and/or shown at any National and/or World Level competitions in Equitation or Performance (walk, trot, canter) at USEF or breed-specific Finals for ages 13 & Under ("Junior Equitation")

-Any middle school rider that has qualified or competed in any National or World Equitation Final that is open to riders 17 & under (example: USEF Saddle Seat Medal Finals / "Good Hands" Championship)

CLASS 6. Future Novice Equitation: Open to riders in grades 6-8. Riders will show at the walk, trot and canter and should be capable of performing tests 1-7. Eligible riders for this division will meet any of the described criteria:

-Riders may have shown in Saddle Seat equitation at unrated shows, county fairs, local shows, 4-H, non breed-specific shows and other similar shows in the walk-trot-canter classes.

-Academy Riders that have shown Walk-Trot-Canter

CLASS 7. Future Beginner Equitation-Walk/Trot: Open to riders in grades 6-8. These riders should be capable of performing tests 1-7; however, these riders will only perform at the walk and trot. (Referenced tests and patterns will only be performed at the walk and trot. Cantering will not be called for or judged in any beginner classes.) Eligible riders for this division must have at least one year continuous instruction and must be able to walk, trot and canter on an unfamiliar mount. Riders will also meet any of the described criteria:

-Riders with NO formal show experience

-Riders that have only shown at unrated shows

-Any Academy Rider that has shown Walk and Trot ONLY, but is able to canter

-Riders who have competed only in Walk-Trot in rated shows (Regional, National, or World championships), but are able to canter.

An additional non-pointed performance class on the rail at the Walk/Trot (class 7x) is an optional offering and is open only to those riders competing in the pointed performance class at the Walk/Trot (class 7). Entry fees will be collected but no individual or team points will be awarded. The intent is not to accommodate lower level riders. Competitors in 7x must meet eligibility requirements of Junior Varsity Beginner Equitation-Walk/Trot and must compete in W/T class 4.

7. Walk/Trot (additional testing at the W/T is allowed)

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7x. Walk/Trot (optional offering, **no additional testing allowed**, and does not count for points) Open only to those riders who are riding in Class 7-W/T

3502 WORKOUT CLASSES -

CLASS 8. Varsity Open Workout-Open to those riders who meet the criteria for Class 1. (Tests 1-15.)

CLASS 9. Varsity Intermediate Workout-Open to those riders who meet the criteria for Class 2. (Tests 1-12.)

CLASS 10. Junior Varsity Novice Workout- Open to those riders who meet the criteria for Class 3. (Tests 1-7.)

CLASS 11. Future Intermediate Workout-Open to those riders who meet the criteria for Class 5. (Tests 1-12.)

CLASS 12. Future Novice Workout-Open to those riders who meet the criteria for Class 6. (Tests 1-7.)

3503 Saddle Seat Rider Tests

A rider must be prepared to perform the tests appropriate for the class in which the rider is participating. Riders may be requested to perform the tests collectively or individually during a show or competition. Tests 1-15 from Section EQ120 of the USEF rulebook will be used according to rider ability levels. In addition to USEF tests 1-15, judges may also: a) Ask an appropriate question regarding horsemanship and/or b) Exchange horses. No other tests may be used. Instructions for performance of the test must be publicly announced or posted.

USEF Tests 1-15 may be referenced in their entirety from the USEF rulebook. The following abridged versions of the tests are listed for convenience:

1. Address reins.
2. Circle at a trot.
3. Performance on the rail at a walk, trot, or canter using the correct leads and diagonals.
4. Performance around the ring at a walk, trot, or canter using the correct leads and diagonals.
5. Feet disengaged from stirrups. Feet engaged. In the line-up only.
6. Change of diagonals on or off the rail.
7. Execute serpentine at a trot.
8. Back for not more than eight steps.
9. Figure eight at trot demonstrating change of diagonals.
10. Circle at the canter.
11. Execute serpentine at a canter.
12. Figure eight at canter.
13. Canter a straight line, on or off the rails, with or without demonstrating simple change of lead.
14. Ride without stirrups for a brief period of time, at any gait requested.
15. Demonstration ride of approximately one minute.

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4100 Competitions and Shows - Applicability of IEA Rules

4101 IEA shall establish rules, regulations, and standards to govern all IEA recognized shows for all classes. These rules, regulations and standards may be changed by the Board of Directors from time to time as

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required to ensure, to the degree possible, the safety of horse and rider and to maintain the quality of competition. IEA shows shall be classified as "Regular Point" and post-season "Regional Finals," "Zone Finals" or "National Finals" shows. Except where specifically stated otherwise, the guidelines for Regular, Regional, Zone and National Shows will be the same.

- 4102** In order to apply to compete in an IEA sanctioned event, show or competition and receive IEA points from that event, show or competition, the rider and/or team must be a qualified IEA member before making application for the show and an IEA membership number must have been assigned to the rider or team.
- 4103** The provisions of these rules shall apply to the following persons: exhibitor, coach, rider, show official, show employee, EHC, show host and co-host, show facility and the designated representative or member of the family of the above, rider members and Team members who act in a manner in violation of the Rules of the IEA or deemed prejudicial to its best interests. Any action in connection with a show in violation of these Rules by a member of the family of a person participating in the Show, who is described in the previous sentence, may be deemed to have been committed by such person and subject her/him to penalties. IEA Member Teams may not adopt rules that circumvent or abridge established IEA rules.
- 4104** A regular point show cannot be double judged for separate show points, and each entry fee must correspond with a separate ride for each opportunity to be judged.
- 4105** The IEA Membership Office approves the date of each show or competition in writing and in advance, and the show is scheduled to commence no earlier than September 15th, and no later than **ten (10) business days** ~~two (2) weeks~~ before the first post season competition, unless special written permission is granted by the IEA President and all additional conditions required by IEA to run that show are strictly followed. Otherwise, even if the show is run, if the additional conditions are not met, the points acquired at the show will not count towards Regional, Zone or National Finals.
- 4106** In zones that are NOT split into regions, the EHC must be prepared to accommodate at least twelve (12) riders in each class offered. In zones that ARE split into regions, the EHC must guarantee at least one entry per class to every team within their region **entering before the priority closing date**.
- 4107** No fewer than three (3) riders will be allowed to compete in a class and a class may not be split for points unless there are twelve (12) or more riders in the class. The number of riders in the class will be determined by the actual number attending and participating in the competition, not by the number of entries. If there are not three (3) riders competing in a class, both upper and middle school riders of the same class level must be combined for that show in order for the rider points to count.
- 4108** The format, Class and Division levels comply with IEA Rules and Regulations.
- 4109** The judge's and show steward's qualifications comply with IEA Rules and Regulations.
- 4110** All coaches are IEA Coach Members in good standing.
- 4111** Schooling times must be set so that all riders and coaches may have the opportunity to observe. EHC's must secure and submit IEA Waivers of Liability for all adult schooling riders who are not current IEA members as per Rule 4407. No IEA member may school a horse over fences or on the flat above their IEA level of riding.
- 4112** No individual rider competing may school any horses to be used in the competition on the day of the competition, until that rider is done competing for that day. During post season shows (Regional, Zone or National Finals) riders must have completely finished showing for the entire competition before they may be used as schooling riders.
- 4113** The last regular season competition will be held at least **ten (10) business days** ~~two (2) weeks~~ before post season competition begins. No individuals or teams may compete in an IEA regular season show during the **ten (10) business days** ~~two (2) weeks~~ preceding their first post season competition.

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4200 Event Host Coordinator (EHC)

4201 A regular point show is a show held by an Event Host Coordinator in compliance with these Rules. Each IEA Team Member must host or co-host IEA regular point show(s) in accordance with Rule 2302.

4202 **One team can be defined as the primary host (EHC) with up to two co-host teams assisting.** Co-hosting is defined as equitable division of cost, reward, labor and services among not more than three teams, as determined by the EHC.

4203 The EHC will be responsible for providing suitable facilities, horses, tack and equipment. [See Rule 4204.3] IEA rules shall govern all classes held at all IEA shows.

4204 Event Host Coordinator Requirements and Responsibilities

4204.1 Any Team, in good standing, College or facility with approval of IEA, may make application to be an Event Host Coordinator ["EHC"] or Event Host Facility ["EHF"] and run an IEA regular point show.

4204.2 While several Teams may co-host a competition, one Team must be the designated host. The Coach of the host Team is the primary decision maker and ultimately responsible for running a safe and quality competition that complies with all IEA rules and regulations.

4204.3 The EHC and/or EHF shall provide suitable facilities, horses and equipment for all entries including stirrup treads for all Hunt Seat saddles.

4204.4 The EHC may limit entries to any number of riders and teams (so long as this limit complies with all other IEA Rules), which shall be binding on all participating teams and riders.

4204.5 For all teams other than a co-host, the EHC may not make entries contingent upon the entering team or riders supplying horses for the event.

4204.6 If a College or other facility will be the EHF, one IEA Team must be designated the host team and responsible pursuant to Rule 4200.

4204.7 The proposed EHC must apply to host an IEA sanctioned event, show or competition on the current IEA Show Hosting Application Form supplied by or made available through IEA.

4204.8 The proposed EHC must agree to comply with the IEA Rules and Regulations and all Show Hosting Policies promulgated by IEA.

4204.9 Prior to submitting the Show Hosting Application, the show date must be approved by the Zone Chair. The IEA Show Hosting Application Form must be received by the IEA Membership Office not less than **sixty (60) days** before the date of the proposed event, show or competition, except for the September shows where applications can be made up to forty-five (45) days before the proposed date. Thereafter, IEA will promptly process the application and determine if the date is available and preliminarily determine if all other show hosting qualifications are fulfilled. Before the EHC may announce the date of the event or supply entry blanks to other IEA members, and in order for the show, competition or event to qualify as a sanctioned IEA regular point show, this Application and the proposed EHC must receive final written approval from the IEA Membership Office.

4204.10 Accompanied by the Show Hosting Application Form, the EHC must ~~acquire and send~~ submit to the IEA Membership Office, ~~and the Office must receive on or before fourteen (14) days before the date of the show, event or competition,~~ an application for insurance from Equisure for the specific show date(s) and in the amounts indicated in the IEA Master Policy. The Certificate of Insurance must specifically name the "Interscholastic Equestrian Association, Inc., its officers, directors, shareholders, employees, agents and representatives" as additional named insureds on the insurance policy for the event, show or competition. Failure to ~~acquire and timely provide~~

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to the IEA Membership Office apply and pay for this required Certificate of Insurance will result in the Show Hosting Application for the event, show or competition to be denied and approval of the EHC to be withdrawn.

4204.11 Any changes to show management or show hosts must be finalized and reported to IEA Membership Office prior to the distribution of the prize list.

4204.12 In order to qualify as an IEA sanctioned event, from which the points will count towards the Zone and National Finals, the event must be timely announced to and open to all IEA Members in the host region. This requires at a minimum a mail or email announcement to all IEA Coaches within that region.

4204.13 Show Information Requirements

The following information must be posted for all coaches and riders in a timely manner:

1. Courses for over fences classes must be posted not less than thirty (30) minutes before the class is to run.
2. Warm-up pattern for over fences classes.
3. Horse List – Descriptions of horses and equipment required.
4. Class list that displays which riders are in which classes and sections.
5. Team point chart that should be updated after each division is completed.

4300 Minimum Entry Requirements for Regular Shows and Classes; Split Classes

4301 A minimum of three (3) IEA Teams must compete in an official Regular IEA point show for Team points to count towards qualifying for Regional, Zone and National Finals.

4302 In cases of inclement weather, for points to count, fifty percent (50%) of the entered riders or fifty percent (50%) of the entered IEA Teams must attend.

4303 In order for a show to count, a host must offer either (a) all classes in the Futures divisions and/or (b) all classes in the Varsity/Junior Varsity divisions as provided in these Rules.

4304 In order for a class to count towards accumulated points, there must be a minimum of three (3) riders in each class. If there are less than three (3) riders in a class, the riders should be placed in another class of the same level. The class could also be run at discretion of the EHC but points will not be counted.

4305 Split Classes

4305.1 Hunt Seat flat classes, Western horsemanship classes and Saddle Seat performance classes **must** be split at twelve (12) riders.

4305.2 Over Fences, Reining and Workout classes **may** be split at twelve (12) riders.

4305.3 The EHC will run, award ribbons, and issue points separately for each of the split classes, as though the class was not split.

4305.4 The assignment of riders to each split class shall be equitable; however, no one section can have fewer than six (6) riders in it for points and awards to be given.

4305.5 During Regional, Zone and National Finals flat classes are permitted to run with twelve (12) riders but the Beginner and Novice levels should canter in two groups.

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4400 Class Routine

4401 In order for the points earned at an IEA sanctioned show to count towards national rankings, the show must comply with Rules 4000-5000. A Championship Class as defined by Rule 3305 is optional and does not have to be offered at a regular point show nor at Zone Finals. All classes offered for which rules are provided herein must be conducted in accordance with these rules. Care and control of horses shall be the sole prerogative of the owners of the horses.

4402 A class in operation at the time of the stopping of a show for any reason shall cease and no placements shall be made. In the event that a class in which horses compete individually is stopped while in progress, due to storm, accident, or other emergency, the following procedure shall govern:

1. If the class is continued at the same session of the show, it shall proceed from the point at which it was stopped.
2. If the class is continued at a succeeding session of the show, it shall be held over in its entirety and no scores credited in the first session shall count.

4403 If the class in which horses compete together is stopped while in progress due to storm, accident, re-ride or other emergency, the class (or test), when recommended, shall be held over in its entirety, and no consideration shall be given to the performance during the original session. If a show is stopped while in progress and is unable to recommence, then any points earned for a completed class will be awarded to the individual rider's point totals, but no team points will be awarded at that show.

4404 It is recommended that fences consist of natural posts and rails, painted rails, brush, oxers (but not square oxers), coops, gates, walls and aikens. Coops that are hinged at the top and free at the bottom are prohibited. All fences must have wings at least twelve inches (12") higher than the top of the fence. Ground lines are mandatory.

4405 All horses (jumping and non-jumping) must be schooled during a posted time on the day of competition. Non-jumping horses must do a minimum of one lap at each gait in each direction. Horses to be used over fences must be schooled over all the fences in the appropriate direction and at the highest height over which they are scheduled to compete. Additional schooling may occur as needed.

4406 On the day of the show, no rider entered may school a horse to be used in the show prior to that rider having competed in his own classes that day. During post season shows (Regionals, Zones, or Nationals) riders must have completely finished showing for the entire competition before they may be used as schooling riders.

4407 All schooling riders must be either (a) an IEA member or (b) a nonmember eighteen (18) years of age or older **and** have signed the IEA approved non-competitor schooling waiver of liability form.

4408 Small ponies shall not be used in IEA shows. Medium ponies may only be used in futures classes.

4500 Show Routine

4501 Rider Warm-up

4501.1 The Event Host Coordinator or Show Host must provide a Schooling Supervisor who is qualified by experience to assist the Show Steward where necessary.

4501.2 No rider, coach or anyone else without the approval of either the Schooling Supervisor or the Show Steward may adjust any tack or equipment, except stirrup lengths.

4501.3 Flat Class riders will mount and ride the horse with no additional warm-up before entry into the competition arena.

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4501.4 Over Fences Class riders will be allowed one lap in each direction around the warm-up arena and two (2) practice jumps before the competition. Practice jumps will be set and adjusted by the schooling supervisor and/or show steward. It is recommended that one jump be set as a cross rail and one as a vertical at the same height as the class in the show arena. The Show Steward should post a set warm-up pattern that complies with the above guidelines.

4501.5 If a show does not have a separate schooling area, a warm-up pattern in the show ring will be posted that complies with IEA guidelines. After the warm-up pattern is completed, the rider may confer with their coach for up to thirty (30) additional seconds before starting the judged round.

4502 Drawing for Horses

4502.1 Drawings will be by lot. The draw shall be held at least twenty (20) minutes prior to the start of each class. Announcement of the draw must precede it by at least ten (10) minutes.

4502.2 If a coach feels that a rider has drawn a horse that the rider is not capable of safely riding, the show steward will determine whether or not the rider can be moved to the designated alternate. **If the steward decides not to grant the request, the coach has the right to withdraw the rider from the competition. That rider's entry fee will be returned and that class will not count toward the show limits for that rider.**

4503 Falls, Refusals and Eliminations

4503.1 A rider is considered to have fallen when the rider is separated from the horse that has not fallen in such a way as to necessitate remounting or vaulting into the saddle. A horse is considered to have fallen when the shoulder and haunch on the same side have touched the ground or an obstacle on the ground.

4503.2 Falls will result in elimination unless it is undeniably clear that the rider fell from the horse through no fault of said rider and due instead to the unanticipated actions of the horse.

4503.3 Re-rides after falls are rare exceptions and may only be granted by show stewards who witnessed the event.

4503.4 Concussion/Injury Awareness

1. Safety of our participants is of the utmost importance. Therefore, when a participant in an IEA competition exhibits signs, symptoms, or behaviors consistent with having sustained a concussion or head injury while participating in a practice or competition, the individual shall be removed from the practice or competition. Further, the individual removed from competition must be assessed by a physician or other licensed healthcare provider and must receive written clearance from such physician or healthcare provider before competing in another IEA competition.
2. It is the rider's responsibility to secure a written statement from a health care provider specifically clearing them for equestrian activities. The rider must give that statement to his/her coach who must submit that statement to the IEA Membership Office.
3. Coaches are expected to be knowledgeable and follow their local and state laws pertaining to head injuries and return-to-play guidelines for youth athletes.

4503.5 Three (3) refusals will result in elimination.

4503.6 In Hunt Seat classes, no courtesy fences will be allowed after elimination.

4503.7 If elimination occurs during a ride-off, the contestant shall be placed in last of all of those chosen for the ride-off.

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4504 Re-rides

- 4504.1** When through no fault of the rider, a horse performs so poorly that it is impossible to fairly judge the rider's ability, a re-ride may be granted.
- 4504.2** A re-ride must be requested before the lineup in a flat class or the last horse leaves the ring in an over fences class.
- 4504.3** Only the coach of the rider involved may request a re-ride.
- 4504.4** Although they may confer with show management and the judge, only the show steward may grant or deny a re-ride.
- 4504.5** If a re-ride is granted in a class in which riders compete individually (over fences, reining, or workout classes), it shall be judged as if the first ride never occurred and the re-ride shall take place after all other rides in that class have been completed.
- 4504.6** If a re-ride is granted in a class in which riders compete together (flat, horsemanship, or performance classes), it will be the Judge's discretion whether to restart the class from the beginning or resume the class from the point when it was stopped.
- 4504.7** During a competition, if it is determined by the sole determination of the show officials who witnessed the event that a rider fell from the horse through no fault of the rider and due instead to the unexpected and unanticipated actions of the horse being ridden, the rider shall be granted a re-ride.

4505 Tack and Aids

- 4505.1** No substitution of tack or aids by exhibitors shall be permitted unless approved by the show steward with permission from the horse provider.
- 4505.2** It is the rider's responsibility to check the tack before mounting; any tack concerns must be communicated to the horse handler or show steward for adjustment.

4506 Use of Whips and Spurs

- 4506.1** Crops, whips or bats may be carried only when specified by the Show Committee.
- 4506.2** Crops, whips and bats are not to be used before entering the ring.
- 4506.3** One or two disciplinary applications in the event of disobedience are sufficient.
- 4506.4** Stewards may rule that a rider be disqualified for improper use of crops, whips or bats.
- 4506.5** **A list of aids appropriate to each horse must be posted or accompany each horse. Riders shall comply with the suggested use of aids.**
- 4506.6** In Hunt Seat, Western and Saddle Seat disciplines spurs are not permitted in the beginner divisions.
- 4506.7** Novice, Intermediate, and Open riders may only use spurs when indicated in the horse description.
- 4506.8** In Hunt Seat and Saddle Seat disciplines spurs can be no larger than ½ inch and should be blunt / smooth and supplied by the horse provider.

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4506.9 Horsemanship and Reining classes may use a ball (non-rowled) spur. If the horse provider feels the horse would perform better in a non-ball spur, it must be specified by the Show Committee and that spur must be supplied by the horse provider.

4506.10 Western Riders should be prepared to provide their own ball (non-rowled) spurs.

4507 Dress and Headgear- Proper Show Attire

4507.1 It is the tradition of the show ring that riders are correctly attired for the class in question and horses properly presented. Show management committee may, at its discretion, bar any entry or person from entering the ring if not suitably presented to appear before an audience and must bar riders without protective headgear from any Hunt Seat or Saddle Seat classes.

4507.2 At all times while mounted, riders in all Hunt Seat or Saddle Seat classes must wear a harnessed and fully fastened protective ASTM approved safety helmet. The IEA will follow the guidelines of USEF in the matter of what constitutes a safety helmet. Riders whose headgear becomes lost or unfastened while on course will be charged with disobedience and must not continue until the problem is corrected on penalty of elimination. Helmets and chinstraps must be fitted properly according to manufacturer's instructions. Ring personnel may assist the rider.

4507.3 Many States have adopted their own statutes pertaining to safety riding helmets. Coaches are expected to be knowledgeable about and follow all local / state guidelines and laws pertaining to safety riding helmets. All participants are expected to comply with the rules of his/her state as well as any state in which he/she competes. All riders (Hunt Seat, Western and Saddle Seat) less than fourteen years of age from the state of New York or who compete in the state of New York must wear a riding helmet that complies with current safety standards.

4507.4 No position aids not otherwise required due to valid medical reasons supported by written doctor's orders will be allowed. The written orders from the physician must be presented to the show steward at each competition or event.

4507.5 Western Attire - It is mandatory for all riders to use appropriate Western tack and Western attire while showing; this would include a long sleeve shirt, Western hat or safety helmet, boots, Western saddle, and Western bridle. Team identifying logos and names shall not be allowed on Western show clothing. Failure to use appropriate attire will result in a score of zero.

4507.6 Saddle Seat Horsemanship and Attire - In all IEA classes, good horsemanship is paramount. Judges are to find the "Best Riders" and not necessarily the best mount. It is mandatory for all riders to wear appropriate, traditional, conservative Saddle Seat attire with hair pulled neatly off the face and neck. ASTM-approved safety helmets are mandatory. Varsity Open riders will show in appropriate riding habits, excluding formal evening attire: a day suit, jacket with matching jodhpurs in a conservative color, a collared shirt, tie, vest, gloves, jodhpur boots, and an ASTM-approved safety helmet. Jackets are NOT permitted for Intermediate, Novice and Beginner riders. Appropriate attire for Intermediate, Novice and Beginner riders consists of solid color jodhpurs / jodhpur boots or paddock boots / long sleeve, button-down shirt / button-down vest / tie / gloves and ASTM approved safety helmet.

4508 Awards – Ribbons and Trophies

4508.1 The Color of ribbons at all shows shall be:

Champion----blue, red, yellow
Reserve----red, yellow, white
First Place----blue
Second Place----red

Third Place----yellow
Fourth Place----white
Fifth Place----pink
Sixth Place----green

RULE 4000: REGULAR SEASON COMPETITIONS: REQUIREMENTS, PROCEDURES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

4508.2 A minimum of six ribbons shall be awarded in each class.

4508.3 The host facility or school, including at the Zone Competitions, shall furnish all ribbons and trophies, except for any perpetual trophies provided by IEA.

4508.4 Sportsmanship Award - The EHC of each regular IEA sanctioned show will award a "Sportsmanship Award" to be chosen by a majority vote of the judge, steward and a designated, but undisclosed, member of the show committee selected by the show steward. The award should be given to the rider who, during the course of the show and competition, best demonstrated the true meaning of sportsmanship.

4508.5 Champion and Reserve ribbons shall be awarded to the first and second place teams. Ribbons or trophies shall be awarded to the Leading Rider and Sportsmanship Award winners.

4508.6 Additional prizes may be given to the winners of each class, to the Champion Team and Leading Rider at each show at the discretion of each host.

4508.7 At the National Finals, each individual class winner, the National Champion rider and the National Championship Team shall be awarded grand championship ribbons and trophies. Reserve through eighth place shall be awarded ribbons.

4509 Tie Breaker Rules

4509.1 At all shows, including Zone and Regional Finals, for all placings, team ties shall be broken first by the total number of 1st place finishes, then by total number of 2nd place finishes, then by the highest total over fences, reining, or work out class points. Designated team point rider scores are the only scores to be considered when breaking team placement ties.

4509.2 If the tie still cannot be determined, a coin toss will determine the tie-break. This method determines both title and awards at all shows except National Finals. This method shall determine the distribution of awards at Nationals, but National Titles shall be shared.

4510 Personal Conduct of Exhibitors, Coaches, and Show Personnel

It is expected that any and all participants and attendees including but not limited to: exhibitors, spectators, coaches, employees, and Board Members will behave in a manner that reflects the dignity of the sport. Ill-mannered conduct will not be tolerated. The show management may expel from the grounds any person whose behavior is deemed dishonest, unethical, unsportsmanlike, or detrimental to the health, safety or well-being of any horse, person, or the Association during the progress of the show. Any unbecoming conduct or communication related in anyway to IEA is subject to review by the ZEC or Executive Committee. Appropriate penalties as outlined in Rule 9502 may be assigned. Members may refer to the Code of Conduct Addendum for additional information concerning appropriate conduct of IEA membership, employees and Board Members.

4511 Cruelty - Soundness / Ride-ability / NSAIDS

Equestrian sport is made possible by the animals that serve the rider. This is a sport of grace and elegance where the rider and animal work as a team. There is neither grace nor elegance in an abusive spectacle. IEA is concerned about animal welfare and encourages good horsemanship. IEA does not condone the use of medications that affect the central nervous system. Cruel or abusive behavior of any type toward the horses will not be tolerated. It is the responsibility, therefore, of all parties concerned to be aware of the conduct of participants and the condition of the horses; and, if a violation is observed, a report must be made immediately to the stewards.

4512 Alcohol and Illegal Substances

The use or possession of alcohol or any illegal substance at a competition or event by the riders, members, exhibitors or coaches is strictly forbidden on the show grounds, and any participant apprehended with such materials will automatically be suspended from the show and membership in IEA.

RULE 5000: PRIZE LIST, ENTRY BLANK, ENTRY FEES AND PROGRAM

5100 Prize List

For all IEA sanctioned competition an electronic copy of the prize list must be submitted to the membership office for approval not less than two (2) weeks prior to the opening date. Once approved, the prize list must then be distributed to all teams within the region one (1) week prior to the opening date. The prize list shall contain:

1. All host and co-host information as it pertains to the formation of the EHC.
2. The name of the judge(s) with credentials, steward(s) with credentials and emergency personnel.
3. Name and address of show manager.
4. The date, location, phone number for the show.
5. Time of registration and start of the show.
6. Opening and Closing date of entries.
7. Information about food and entertainment.
8. Amount of entry fees.
9. Disclosure statement.
10. Affordable motel information and map.

5200 Entry Blank

5201 The entry blank must contain spaces for the rider's name, IEA number, class numbers, and the name of the Team.

5202 Each Coach must sign the entry blank. In the event of failure to do so, the first entrance into the ring of an exhibitor of that Team shall constitute acceptance of the Rules and Regulations of IEA and the Show by the Coach, Team and rider, and ipso facto render him/her subject to said rules.

5203 Each entry blank must contain the following statement to be signed by the coach making entry:

In exchange for entrance to and participation in the show, this entry constitutes an agreement and affirmation that the team making it, and each of its riders, coaches, trainers, and representatives shall accept and abide by the Rules and Regulations of the IEA and of the Show, and that each rider, coach and Team: (1) is a member in good standing of IEA, (2) is eligible as entered, and (3) will accept as final all rulings of IEA and the show steward (or committee) with respect to their conduct. Also, through participation each rider, **rider's parents/legal guardians**, coach, trainer, and participant acknowledges **THAT HORSES ARE INTRINSICALLY DANGEROUS AND UNPREDICTABLE AND CAN CAUSE SERIOUS INJURY OR DEATH**, thus each agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless IEA, its officers, directors, members, employees, **Executive Director**, National Steward, agents and representatives, the Event Host Coordinator, the host team and facility, the show stewards, stewards committee members, the show judges, the show secretary, all show organizers and officials, and all persons, stables, and others providing facilities, horses or equipment for the Show, other riders, coaches, teams and team sponsoring institutions, from any claim, action or suit, for injury, property damage or death sustained by the individual, rider, entity, coach, trainer, or participant while traveling to, from and around the show, while staying in the city for the show, during participation in the show and while at the show. This entry constitutes an acceptance of the hired officials at this event.

RULE 5000: PRIZE LIST, ENTRY BLANK, ENTRY FEES AND PROGRAM

5300 Entries

- 5301** The EHC must first open entries to members of their own region (if the zone is divided) or zone (if not divided), and offer a reasonable amount of time for a deadline.
- 5302** After the initial deadline date, entries may be opened to members from other regions and zones if space permits.
- 5303** The acceptance of substitutions is entirely at the discretion of the EHC.
- 5304** ~~A show may adopt its own policy regarding the refunding of entry fees to an exhibitor who cancels entries after the closing date.~~
- 5305** Scratches prior to closing date will be refunded.
- 5306** The Event Host is not obligated to refund scratches after the closing date.
- 5307** Whenever entry money is collected, IEA must receive the \$4.00 per entry per class fee.
- 5308** Any violation of financial obligations will result in the member being restricted from future shows until such fees are paid, including monies due to the National Treasurer.
- 5309** Show management may require entries to be paid before the first class.
- 5310** In case of discrepancy between information in the program and that of the entry blank, the entry blank shall take precedence.
- 5311** It is recommended that all entries received by the closing date be acknowledged by the Show Secretary, including a schedule indicating the classes for each entry.
- 5312** The EHC may limit the number of entries so long as it is done in a fair and equitable manner, and does not require entrants to supply horses for the event.
- 5313** ~~No refund of show fees shall be given after the closing date set by the host team, school or facility.~~

5400 Show and Entry Fees

- 5401** Show Fees shall be charged for each IEA regular point show, Regional and Zone Finals separate and apart from annual IEA membership dues.
- 5402** \$4.00 from each individual rider's entry fee for each class shall be collected by the show host and paid to IEA within fourteen (14) days of the show, of which IEA will send \$1.00 to the Zone Chairman, for zone use.
- 5403** Entry fees for Regular IEA shows, other than Regionals, Zones and Nationals, will be no more than \$40.00 per rider per class.
- 5404** No fee will be charged for the coach.
- 5405** No additional fee will be charged to the Team.
- 5406** All entry fees collected shall be distributed between the host team(s) and the IEA National Office.
- 5407** Entry fee payment shall be made before the competition. Any Team or responsible individual that has not paid the entry fees by the end of the competition shall forfeit all points earned and be assessed late fees, and if necessary, collection fees over and above the entry fees.

RULE 5000: PRIZE LIST, ENTRY BLANK, ENTRY FEES AND PROGRAM

5408 Entry fees are non-refundable once the closing date designated by the host has passed. Substitutions of riders may be made until the day of the competition, although the EHC may charge a \$10.00 office fee for any team making changes to their entries after the closing date.

5500 Programs

Printed show programs are required and should be distributed to each coach on the day of the show and an official copy must be sent to the Membership office. However, it is not mandatory that additional copies be available for sale or distribution. These programs can be printed on 8 1/2 x 11 paper stock and should contain a statement of prizes offered for each class, the classes listed in order, the tentative time scheduled of classes, and the names of show stewards. If available, a program insert sheet can include an alphabetical list of exhibitors by team with their numbers and class sections entered, with a numerical list of exhibitors in each class.

RULE 6000: OFFICIALS, JUDGES AND STEWARDS

The term "show official" shall include and refer to all persons directly engaged by the show, including the Manager, Secretary, Steward(s), ~~Steward-Committee~~ and Judge.

6100 Show Manager and Secretary

6101 Show Manager, who shall be responsible for the operation of the show.

6102 Show Secretary, who shall be in charge of:

1. Applying for the show date.
2. Hiring the judges and officials necessary for the operation of the show.
3. Appointing and identifying in the program the show stewards who shall be present throughout the show.
4. Distributing the prize lists.
5. Processing the entries.
6. Providing qualified medical personnel on grounds for all scheduled performances and an ambulance on the show grounds or on call for the entire scheduled performance. Qualified medical personnel is a currently certified or licensed EMT or Paramedic, or a Physician or nurse trained in pre-hospital trauma care and currently certified or licensed in their profession. A physician or nurse trained in pre-hospital trauma care is a physician or nurse who is currently certified in Advanced Trauma Life Support, Basic Trauma Life Support, Pre-hospital Trauma Life Support, or who has First Responder or comparable certification. It is strongly recommended that EMTs and/or Paramedics be used to fill this position. Medical personnel must not exceed the scope of their practice. The medical personnel who will be on the grounds during the competition must be listed in the prize list.
7. Marking the official programs with special regard to scratches, substitutions, additions and other corrections.
8. Checking class sheets against actual riders and numbers.
9. Providing one (1) copy of the program that contains all changes, corrections, scores, scratches, substitutions and official results to IEA.

RULE 6000: OFFICIALS, JUDGES AND STEWARDS

10. The Coach of the host Team shall verify that the correct fees have been collected and remitted to IEA in a timely manner. IEA may suspend a Team until the show fees are paid and no individual or team points won by the host team shall be counted in determining eligibility for the National Competition unless and until the show fees are paid to and received by IEA.
11. Report in writing to IEA within fourteen (14) days of the close of the show the name of any exhibitor whose fees are not negotiable.
12. Report to show stewards in writing, any act on the part of any person deemed prejudicial to the best interests of the Association.
13. Furnish the judges in each class a scorecard containing exact specifications as shown in the catalogue or as amended if in conflict with the rules.
14. Be responsible for all matters in connection with substitutions.
15. Insure that no entry shall compete until the designated Team **coach** representative has signed the entry blank.
16. Familiarize the judges with the differences between IEA rules and those of IHSA or USEF.
17. Remit dues to IEA Membership Secretary within fourteen (14) days of the show. The \$4.00 per entry fee should be sent along with the completed show packet.
18. Remit both individual rider and team points and results to IEA Membership Secretary within fourteen (14) days of the show.

6200 Judges Qualifications

6201 To officiate at a regular season IEA show, a judge must be licensed in the division he/she is to judge as follows:

6201.1 Hunt Seat: USEF registered “r” or recorded “R”

6201.2 Western: USEF, AQHA, or NRHA

6201.3 Saddle Seat: Recognized or Recorded Judge with USEF, ASHA, AMHA (Morgan), or AHA (Arabian)

6202 A judge not qualified as stated in Rule 6201 may be used only with prior written consent from all Coaches of teams participating in that region. Unless they are on the Region or Zone pre-approved list, a non-licensed judge must be approved every time she/he is to be hired.

6203 Pre-approved Judge List

6203.1 A pre-approved list of non-licensed judges may be established each year in any Region or Zone.

6203.2 The pre-approved list should be decided prior to the first competition in that Region or Zone.

6203.3 It should be unanimous and reviewed annually.

6203.4 Once on the pre-approved list, the judge may be used without soliciting written approval.

6203.5 Consent from Coaches of teams that join after the approval and publication of the pre-approved list is not required.

RULE 6000: OFFICIALS, JUDGES AND STEWARDS

6203.6 Only in extraordinary circumstances should a judge be added to the list during the competition season.

6203.7 In Regions or Zones operating without a pre-approved list or before hiring a judge who was not previously submitted for a pre-approved list, a non-licensed judge may only be hired if unanimous written consent is obtained from all Coaches of teams participating in that show from that Region. Consent from Coaches of teams participating from outside the Region is not required.

6203.8 As a courtesy, when use of a substitute judge (licensed or from the pre-approved list) is required, the EHC should make every effort to inform participating teams of the change prior to the competition day.

6204 A person may judge only one show managed by any particular EHC within the same competition season.

6205 An individual should be limited to judging no more than two (2) regular IEA shows during a competition season within each Region or within the Zone if not split.

6206 Once a judge is hired for Regional, Zone, or National Finals he/she may not judge a regular season show after January 1st of that same competition year.

6207 Judges for Region, Zone, and National Finals must be USEF ("r" or "R"), AQHA or NRHA registered judges in the division in which they are to adjudicate.

6208 A judge may not officiate if he/she has had a professional relationship as defined by the USEF, AQHA or NRHA rules, including clinics with any exhibitor or Member Team, within sixty (60) days prior to the show.

6209 No IEA individual member may show before a judge with whom he/she has had a professional relationship as defined by the USEF, AQHA or NRHA rules, including clinics, within sixty (60) days prior to the show.

6210 Judges are to be listed in the prize list when submitted to the IEA Membership Office for approval.

6300 Responsibilities of a Judge

6301 Good judging depends upon a correct observance of the fine points and the selection of the best rider under the conditions of the class. A judge serves three interests: her/his own conscience, exhibitors and spectators. She/he should make clear to the audience that the best rider wins. The attention of the judges is directed to the difference in requirements between USEF equitation classes and IEA equitation classes. A judge is obligated to adjudicate each class in conformity with the rules and specifications of that class as they appear in this IEA Rule Book. He/she is expected to be proficient in his/her Division and to possess a working knowledge of the IEA Rules and Regulations.

6302 The decision of each judge constitutes solely her/his individual preference and not a verdict by IEA.

6303 No one shall approach a judge with regard to a decision unless she/he first obtains permission from a steward, who shall arrange an appointment with the judge at a proper time and place. In order to inspect a judge's card, an exhibitor must first obtain show management's permission and be accompanied by his/her coach and the show steward.

6304 A judge must order from the ring any unruly horse or one whose actions threaten to endanger other exhibitors.

6305 A judge should inspect courses of fences after they have been set.

RULE 6000: OFFICIALS, JUDGES AND STEWARDS

6400 Non-Protestable Decisions

The following decisions cannot be protested under any circumstances:

1. The soundness of a horse or the suitability of a rider or a horse, when determined by a Steward of the Show or by a Judge, is not a violation of the rules.
2. Judge's decision, representing his/her individual preference, is not a violation of the rules. The laws of the State of Ohio shall govern the construction or application of the IEA Rules. If the rules of the IEA do not apply to a given situation, then first the rules and regulations of IHSA and if not resolved then the rules of USEF (for the Hunt Seat and Saddle Seat disciplines) and the rules of AQHA (for the Western discipline) may be used as a reference for guidance in making an equitable decision under the circumstances, including but not limited to procedural questions.

6500 Show Steward Qualifications

6501 An IEA Steward must be twenty-one (21) years of age, must have read and fully understand the Rules and Regulations of IEA, USEF and IHSA and holds any one of the following qualifications:

1. Licensed USEF steward for Hunter/jumper disciplines; category 2 for Saddle Seat discipline
2. Current IEA Board Member or Employee; or
3. IEA Member Coach, in good standing, whose Team is not, and members of the coach's team are not, otherwise participating in the competition; or
4. IHSA member coach, in good standing, who is not otherwise participating in the competition.

6502 A Show Steward not meeting qualification criteria outlined in Rule 6501 may be used only with prior written consent from Coaches of teams participating in that region. Unless they are on the Region or Zone pre-approved list, a Steward not meeting qualification criteria must be approved every time she/he is to be hired.

6503 Pre-approved Steward List

6503.1 A pre-approved list of show stewards not meeting criteria outlined in the rules may be established each year in any Region or Zone.

6503.2 The pre-approved list should be decided prior to the first competition in that Region or Zone.

6503.3 It should be unanimous and reviewed annually.

6503.4 Once on the pre-approved list, the show steward may be used without soliciting written approval.

6503.5 Consent from Coaches of teams that join after the approval and publication of the pre-approved list is not required.

6503.6 Only in extraordinary circumstances should a show steward be added to the list during the competition season.

6503.7 In Regions or Zones operating without a pre-approved list or before hiring a show steward who was not previously submitted for a pre-approved list, a show steward not meeting qualification criteria may only be hired if unanimous written consent is obtained from all Coaches of teams participating in that show from that Region. Consent from Coaches of teams participating from outside the Region is not required.

RULE 6000: OFFICIALS, JUDGES AND STEWARDS

6503.8 As a courtesy when use of a substitute show steward (qualified or from the pre-approved list) is required, the EHC should make every effort to inform participating teams of the change prior to the competition day.

6600 Number of Show Stewards

6601 A Regular IEA Point Show must have at least one (1) qualified Show Steward as defined in Rule 6501. The Show Steward should not be affiliated with the Event Host or host facility. If a ruling relates to a horse provided by a Show Steward, other Show Stewards or the Judge will cast the deciding vote.

6602 Regional Finals, Zone Finals and National Finals shall have at least two (2) qualified Show Stewards. Both the National Steward and Associate National Steward should be present at National Finals.

6700 Duties of a Show Steward

6701 Show Stewards serve to interpret the IEA Rules and Regulations. Steward's duties include, but are not restricted to the following:

1. Protect the interests of exhibitors, judges and show management.
2. Investigate and act upon any alleged rule violations without waiting for a protest.
3. Report to the show committee any misrepresentation or substitution of entry without waiting for a protest.
4. Ascertain that all judges are recognized in the divisions to which assigned.
5. Post warm-up pattern for over fences classes.
6. Report to the show committee any violation of the Rules and proffer charges against the violator if not otherwise properly handled.
7. Permit re-rides, under specific conditions, as agreed upon by the show and stable management, or as allowed by these Rules.
8. Determine, under extenuating circumstances or extreme unfairness to one or more exhibitors, if a class should be rerun.
9. Supervise the drawing of horses.
10. Determine the suitability of rider to horse, rider to class, and horse to class level.
11. Stop a class in the event a horse or rider should be considered unsafe.
12. Fill out and return to the IEA Membership Secretary within fourteen (14) days of the show, a show report in the form required by IEA.

6702 Classification of Riders by Stewards

When the class designation of a rider is called into question, the chief show steward at the rider's next competition (or if during a show, that chief show steward) will review the rider's ability for proper class placement. The IEA show stewards will give advice if requested, and shall have the power to reclassify riders who are competing at incorrect levels, and all points and ribbons won in such incorrect classes shall be forfeited.

RULE 7000: JUDGING REQUIREMENTS

In all IEA classes, good horsemanship is paramount. Judges are to find the “Best Riders” and not necessarily the best mount.

7100 General Guidelines

- 7101** In equitation/horsemanship classes, only the rider is being judged; therefore no penalty should be assessed because of the horse’s conformation, color or way of going.
- 7102** Rule 4503 shall govern falls, refusals and eliminations. Any rider not having his/her mount under sufficient control shall be removed from the ring by the stewards and shall be disqualified or remounted at their discretion.
- 7103** Riders must remain on the same mount throughout all phases of an equitation or horsemanship class until the judge requests a change. No attendant shall be allowed in the ring except at the request of the judge or stewards.
- 7104** If additional tests are desired and appropriate, the judge’s instructions to riders shall be publicly announced. It is suggested that the judge go over these instructions with the announcer to assure mutual understanding of the wording. Judges shall not confer with riders individually during the line-up.

7200 Hunt Seat Equitation – Hands and Seat

- 7201** Rider should have a competent appearance, seat and hands light and supple, conveying the impression of complete control should any emergency arise.
- 7202** To mount, take up the reins in left hand and place hand on withers. Grasp stirrup leather with right hand, insert foot in stirrup and mount. To dismount, rider may either step down or slide down. The size of the rider must be taken into consideration.
- 7203** Hands should be over and in front of horse’s withers, knuckles 30 degrees inside the vertical, hands slightly apart and making a straight line from the horse’s mouth to the rider’s elbow. Method of holding reins is optional but all reins must be picked up at the same time.
- 7204** The eyes should be up and shoulders back. Toes should be at an angle best suited to rider’s conformation, ankles flexed, heels down, calf of leg in contact with horse and slightly behind girth. Iron should be on ball of foot.
- 7205** At the walk and slow trot, body should be vertical; posting trot, inclined forward; canter, half-way between the posting trot and the walk; galloping and jumping, same inclination as the posting trot.

7300 Hunt Seat Class Routine

7301 Over Fences

- 7301.1** The performance begins when the horse enters the ring or is given the signal to proceed after entering the ring.
- 7301.2** Except for refusals, jumping faults of the horse are not to be considered unless it is the fault of the rider.
- 7301.3** Except in combinations, number of strides shall not be considered unless it is the fault of the rider.
- 7301.4** Although a flying change of lead is preferable, a well-executed simple change must not be penalized.

RULE 7000: JUDGING REQUIREMENTS

7301.5 Each contestant may include one courtesy circle, if desired, before approaching the first jump. She/he shall then proceed around the course, keeping an even pace throughout. Three cumulative refusals will eliminate. If a refusal occurs in a double or triple, riders shall rejump all elements of the combination. No courtesy fence will be allowed after elimination.

7302 On the Flat

7302.1 Contestants shall enter ring and shall proceed at least once around the ring at each appropriate gait and on command, reverse and repeat.

7302.2 Light contact with the horse's mouth is required. Entries shall then line up on command, and any or all riders may be required to execute any appropriate tests included in class requirements.

7400 Course Requirements and Hunt Seat Tests

7401 Classes over fences shall be held over at least six (6) jumps, type to be left to the discretion of management.

7402 A Hunt Seat judge may choose from the tests listed in Rule 3305. Tests may be performed collectively or individually. No other tests may be used except at the National Finals where additional appropriate tests may be asked. Instructions must be publicly announced.

7500 General Guidelines for Western Horsemanship Equitation

7501 Hands

7501.1 The upper arms are in a straight line with the body, the one holding the reins bent at the elbow.

7501.2 Some movement of the arms is permissible, but excessive pumping will be penalized.

7501.3 The position of the hand not holding the rein is optional, but it should be kept free of the horse and equipment, and held in a relaxed manner with the rider's body straight at all times.

7501.4 The hand is to be around the reins at all times.

7501.5 No more than one finger is permitted between the reins when split reins are used, but none with romal reins. Rider may hold the romal in the free hand provided it is at least 16" from the rein hand.

7501.6 Rein hand to be carried immediately above or slightly ahead of the horn of the saddle.

7501.7 Bracing against horn will be penalized.

7501.8 Reins should be carried so as to have light contact with the horse's mouth.

7501.9 Two hands may be used only on horses designated by the show committee. It is recommended that these horses be shown in a snaffle bit or hackamore.

7502 Basic Rider Position:

7502.1 Riders shall sit in saddle with legs hanging underneath.

7502.2 The stirrup should be just short enough to allow the heels to be lower than the toes.

RULE 7000: JUDGING REQUIREMENTS

7502.3 The body should always appear comfortable, relaxed and flexible.

7502.4 Feet should be placed in the stirrups with the weight on the ball of the foot.

7600 Western Class Routine

7601 Western Horsemanship Class Routine

7601.1 All classes for which rules are provided herein must be conducted accordingly.

7601.2 Riders shall enter the ring and show collectively on the rail at all required gaits in both directions prior to any individual testing. The order to reverse should be executed away from the rail. Riders shall line up on command.

7601.3 A judge may change riders from any horse to any other horse in the same class. This may occur provided rail work or pattern has been completed by all riders.

7601.4 Any or all riders may be required to execute any appropriate test included in class requirements. Testing is optional in all classes except at the National Finals where it is mandatory.

7602 Reining Class Routine

7602.1 Riders are to perform individually before the judge. Three markers will be placed on the left and right rail. A center marker and two end markers spaced appropriately to the size of the arena to allow easy passage beyond the markers. Personal appointments, position and procedures are consistent with rules governing IEA Western Horsemanship division.

7602.2 Riders will be judged on symmetry of figures; properly placed variations of speed, direction, and sizes of circles; proper technical application of natural aids in obtaining lead changes, stops, and turns; and reasonable working horsemanship. Emphasis is on precision, technical application, and the ability to show an unfamiliar horse in a pre-assigned pattern. Results as shown by the performance of the horse are NOT necessarily to be considered more important than the methods used by the rider in obtaining them.

7700 Reining Pattern Requirements

7701 All riders in the same class will be asked to perform the same pre-assigned pattern.

7702 All patterns will be posted not less than thirty (30) minutes before the class.

7703 Patterns will be selected from official NRHA/AQHA/IHSA patterns.

7704 In the event horses are not capable of flying lead changes or four (4) spins, patterns may require one (1) or two (2) spins and/or simple lead changes.

7705 Riders are judged individually upon entering the ring and judging ends upon completion of the final maneuver. A judge's decision is final.

7706 Any rider being off pattern will receive a score of zero (0) and cannot place or receive points in that class.

7707 Two hands may be used only on horses designated by the show committee and listed in the horse description chart. It is recommended that these horses be shown in a snaffle bit or hackamore.

RULE 7000: JUDGING REQUIREMENTS

7800 Saddle Seat Equitation

7801 Hands and Seat - Reference USEF EQ 116.

7802 Class Routine

7802.1 Performance Classes - Riders will work collectively on the rail. Additional testing will be optional and at the judge's discretion. IEA Rule 3503 containing USEF tests 1-15 (See EQ120 of USEF rulebook) will be used as noted. In addition to tests 1-15, judges may also:
a) Ask an appropriate question regarding horsemanship and/or b) Exchange horses.

7802.2 Work Out Classes - Riders will be judged on their performance of a posted pattern/workout based on IEA Rule 3503 (USEF Saddle Seat Tests 1-15) that are appropriate to each ability level. Tests will be designed by the judge or a member of the show committee and will incorporate appropriate level tests. Tests will be posted not less than thirty (30) minutes prior to the start of the class. In addition to tests 1-15, judges may also: a) Ask an appropriate question regarding horsemanship and/or b) Exchange horses. Group rail work will be optional and at the judge's discretion.

7803 Saddle Seat Rider Tests

7803.1 Additional testing will be optional and at the judge's discretion.

7803.2 USEF tests 1-15 (See EQ120 of USEF rulebook).

7803.3 In addition to USEF tests 1-15, judges may also:
a) Ask an appropriate question regarding horsemanship and/or
b) Exchange horses.

RULE 8000: POINTS, SCORING AND POST SEASON QUALIFICATION

8100 General Point Requirements and Scoring

8101 The points will be counted and awarded as follows:

First place _____	7 points	Fourth place _____	3 points
Second place _____	5 points	Fifth place _____	2 points
Third place _____	4 points	Sixth place _____	1 point

8102 Points and division assignment will follow riders who transfer to other teams throughout their eligibility.

8103 No matter how many individual team members are present at a given competition, points are assigned to each individual and to the group as a team.

8103.1 If a rider is deemed to have been placed illegally, points from regular season shows will be redistributed according to the ruling by the ZEC and National Steward. Placings in post season shows will be adjusted according to the ruling by the ZEC and National Steward. Team points for regular and post season shows will be redistributed as needed per Rule 8107.7.

8104 Procedures

8104.1 The show secretary must act as or designate a point keeper at each regular show. The point keeper will be responsible for tracking individual and team points during the horse show.

8104.2 Upon the conclusion of the competition, an official program, the IEA Show Report, copies of entry forms, judge's cards, point rider forms, team competition results, schooling rider waivers

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(if applicable) and show fees (\$4.00 per entry per class) must be submitted to the IEA Membership Office within fourteen (14) days after the close of the show for national tracking. The show report should include the competition date and number of entries including number of scratches. A check payable to "IEA" should be attached to the Show Report.

8105 Official Posting of Results

8105.1 In order to have Individual and Team results of the competition officially posted to count towards national standings, the written results from the show competition must be received by the IEA Membership Office within fourteen (14) calendar days after the last day of the competition. All funds must be paid in United States currency.

8105.2 Copies of the results shall be sent to the Zone Chairmen.

8105.3 The official point records, maintained at IEA Membership Office, shall determine the class advancement of riders and their eligibility for the National Finals.

8105.4 The Coach of each Member Team should also maintain a complete record of each rider's individual points for the sake of determining rider advancement.

8106 Leading Riders for Regular Season Shows

The Leading Rider at each regular IEA show or competition will be the winner of the Varsity Open Championship class. No other individual championships will be awarded.

8107 High Point Teams for Regular Season Shows

8107.1 Each Team will designate one rider per class to compete for points toward the team championship.

8107.2 Point riders may be selected from any section of Classes 1 through 12. Only one rider may be selected from each class regardless of the number of sections.

8107.3 Point riders must be registered with the scorekeeper or secretary before the first draw. Teams who fail to register point riders prior to the first draw shall have the first eligible riders listed on their entry blank designated by the show as point riders.

8107.4 After the draw has occurred, point riders may only be substituted for extraordinary circumstances, such as injury during the show. The show steward must approve this substitution, and the class must be re-drawn. Once a class has started no substitution can be made under any circumstance.

8107.5 At each regular point show, the total points as awarded to each team's designated point riders, will determine the hierarchy of team rankings.

8107.6 Team rankings at each regular point show will be awarded as follows: Champion – 7 points; Reserve Champion - 5 points; 3rd place - 4 points; 4th place – 3 points; 5th place – 2 points; and 6th place – 1 point.

8107.6 In the case of a tie for the team championship of a regular show, Rule 4509 will apply.

8107.7 If an ineligible rider is used as a team point rider, the team will lose that score and one more score will be dropped, regardless of the size of the team. This penalty applies for each class in which the rider was used. The score to be dropped will be the lowest score greater than zero.

RULE 8000: POINTS, SCORING AND POST SEASON QUALIFICATION

8200 Post Season Qualification

Show points may only be accumulated by teams and riders by competing in IEA sanctioned regular point shows located anywhere in the United States during the competition year. All such show points will count towards qualification for Zone Finals.

8201 Hunt Seat and Western Teams qualify for Regional or Zone Finals (in Zones not split into regions), or National Finals (for instances in which a Zone Final team competition is not needed) by accumulating twenty (20) points during the competition year.

8202 Hunt Seat and Western Riders qualify for Regional or Zone Finals (in areas not split into regions), or National Finals (for instances in which a Zone Final individual competition is not needed) by accumulating a minimum of fifteen (15) points in that class during the competition year. Hunt Seat and Western riders may not show in more than five (5) regular point shows per class per year. Riders will qualify separately for each class within their division.

8203 Riders must have participated in a minimum of two (2) regular season point shows in their assigned class(es) if they are to be designated as a point rider in said class(es) for their team in post season competitions.

8300 Regional Finals

8301 The top twelve (12) qualified riders in each class, and not more than twelve (12) riders, and the top twelve (12) teams, and not more than twelve (12) teams from Regional Finals, will be invited to Zone Finals. In the event there are more than twelve (12) qualified riders or teams, Zones utilizing regional splits will use a Regional Finals to determine which riders and teams will advance to Zone Finals. In the case of a tie at Regional or Zone Finals, the tie breaker in Rule 4509 will be used to determine which riders and teams will advance.

8302 Regional Finals will consist of only teams and riders that have qualified for Zone Finals under Rule 8200 in Zones that have been divided into regions.

8303 Regional Finals will be held at least ten (10) business days ~~two (2) weeks~~ before Zone Finals.

8304 A minimum of eight ribbons shall be awarded in each class.

8400 Zone Finals

8401 There will be no more than twelve (12) riders per class at the Zone Finals and no more than twelve (12) teams at Zone Finals. Rider and team allotments for Zone Finals will be proportionately divided among the regions of the zone based upon the number of members in each region as determined by IEA membership on December 31st of each year.

8402 Teams and individuals will qualify for Zone Finals under Rule 8200.

8403 The Zone Finals shall be held at a location designated by the Zone Chair and approved by the IEA Membership Secretary. All Zone Finals will be commenced on a date no later than fifteen (15) business days ~~three (3) weeks~~ before the date established for the IEA National Finals. It is mandatory that the Zone Chair organize, attend and supervise the Zone Finals.

8404 The top competitive teams and the top individual riders per class, as determined by Rule 8500, competing at the Zone Finals (assuming there are Zone Finals in each of these categories) are then eligible for invitations to the National Finals.

8405 A minimum of eight ribbons shall be awarded in each class.

RULE 8000: POINTS, SCORING AND POST SEASON QUALIFICATION

8500 National Finals

8501 General

8501.1 In the spring of each year on a date and at a location designated by IEA, a National Finals competition will be conducted for the top qualifiers of the Zone Finals, and otherwise in accordance with the qualifying criteria as outlined in the IEA Rules and Regulations.

8501.2 IEA shall host a National Finals Show to determine and award teams and individuals with national titles.

8501.3 There will be a separate entry fee for the National Finals.

8501.4 IEA reserves the right to make changes to the Regional, Zone, or National Finals schedule and/or procedures of competition provided any changes to the standard format are approved by the IEA Executive Committee.

8502 Rider Qualifications and Eligibility for IEA National Finals

8502.1 Riders may compete in only one classification per year at National Finals. No rider shall be allowed to compete at a higher level in National competition without first demonstrating the ability to compete at the higher level during the regular season.

8502.2 Substitutions in the individual competition will be accepted only if those substitutions are arranged at the Zone Finals and are sent in at the same time as the Zone Finals results. Any rider that does not plan to attend National Finals will have their coach notify the Zone Chair IN WRITING at the morning coaches meeting at Zone Finals; if that rider places in such a way that they would advance to National Finals, the Zone Chair will assign the next rider in line to compete at National Finals, and will send this change to the IEA Membership Office with the Zone Finals results.

8502.3 The Varsity Open Championship Classes as offered at regular point shows do not count toward individual points for National Finals qualification.

8503 Team Qualifications and Eligibility for IEA National Finals

8503.1 The National Team Championship will be awarded to the qualifying team that accumulates the most points at the National Finals competition.

8503.2 Team members may change from show to show. However, at the National Finals in team competition, there can only be one rider for each class.

8503.3 Substitutions in the team competition will be accepted only if those substitutions are arranged AT the Zone Finals and are sent in at the same time as the Zone Finals results. Any team that does not plan to attend Nationals will notify the Zone Chair IN WRITING at the morning coaches meeting at Zone Finals; if that team places in such a way that they would advance to National Finals, the Zone Chair will assign the next team in line to compete at National Finals, and will send this change to the Membership Office with the Zone Final results. After National team entries have been submitted, point rider substitutions may be allowed on a case-by-case basis, but are not guaranteed.

8504 Class Specifications- Hunt Seat Individual Rider Competition

8504.1 There will be no more than twenty-four (24) riders per class at the National Finals.

8504.2 Each active IEA Zone may send one Rider per class, as listed in Rules 3301 and 3302, to National Finals. To be considered an active Zone there must be a minimum of three (3) eligible teams of the same age group (Futures or Upper School) that compete in a minimum

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of two (2) competitions held within the Zone during the regular competition season. Membership from a Zone with fewer than three (3) active teams as of November 15th will be assigned by the Board of Directors to another Zone for the remainder of the competition year.

8504.3 The remaining twelve (12) rider positions for National Finals will be proportionately divided among the Zones based upon the number of members in each Zone as determined by IEA membership on December 31st of each year. Calculations will be based on total individual rider memberships, and they will be split into calculations for middle school total members and upper school total members. These percentages will then be applied to all individual class allotments and to all team class allotments at Nationals. In the case of any allotted spots that can not be awarded by mathematical percentages, any unused allotments will be put into a random draw and all zones that represent 15% or more of the membership in that category will be eligible to potentially draw the lottery-allotted spot. The draw will be done by the Executive Director and supervised by the National Steward. IEA will promptly notify the Zone Chairmen at the beginning of each calendar year of the number of additional rider members per class a Zone may send to National Finals.

8504.4 Within the National Finals, the top ten (10) point earners in Varsity Open individual classes, who are eligible to compete in Varsity Open over fences, will qualify for the National Varsity Open Championship class.

8504.5 The National Varsity Open Championship class will be run under the same guidelines as the Varsity Open Championship as offered at regular competitions.

8505 Class Specifications- Hunt Seat Team Competition

8505.1 There will be no more than twenty-four (24) Teams at National Finals.

8505.2 Each active Zone may send one Team to National Finals. To be considered an active Zone there must be a minimum of three (3) eligible teams of the same age group (Futures or Upper School) that compete in a minimum of two (2) competitions held within the Zone during the regular competition season. Membership from a Zone with fewer than three (3) active teams as of November 15th will be assigned by the Board of Directors to another Zone for the remainder of the competition year.

8505.3 The remaining twelve (12) Teams for Nationals will be proportionately divided among the Zones based upon the number of Teams in each Zone as determined by IEA membership on December 31st of each year. IEA will promptly notify the Zone Chairmen at the beginning of each calendar year of the number of additional Teams a Zone may send to Nationals.

8505.4 Each of these teams may send one rider for each team point rider class offered at the National Finals.

8506 Class Specifications- Western Individual Rider Competition

8506.1 In the Western Discipline, there will be no more than twelve (12) riders per class at the National Finals.

8506.2 Each active IEA Zone may send one Rider per class, as listed in Rules 3401 and 3402, to National Finals.

8506.3 The remaining rider positions for National Finals will be proportionately divided among the Zones based upon the number of members in each Zone as determined by IEA membership on December 31st of each year. Calculations will be based on total individual rider memberships, and they will be split into calculations for middle school total members and upper school total members. These percentages will then be applied to all individual class allotments and to all team class allotments at Nationals. In the case of any allotted spots that

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can not be awarded by mathematical percentages, any unused allotments will be put into a random draw and all zones that represent 15% or more of the membership in that category will be eligible to potentially draw the lottery-allotted spot. The draw will be done by the Executive Director and supervised by the National Steward. IEA will promptly notify the Zone Chairmen at the beginning of each calendar year of the number of additional rider members per class a Zone may send to National Finals.

8507 Class Specifications- Western Team Competition

8507.1 Each active Zone may send one Team to National Finals.

8507.2 There will be no more than twelve (12) Teams at the nationals.

8507.3 The remaining Team spots will be proportionately divided among the Zones based upon the number of Teams in each Zone as determined by IEA membership on December 31st of each year. IEA will promptly notify the Zone Chairmen at the beginning of each calendar year of the number of additional Teams a Zone may send to National Finals.

8507.4 Each of these teams may send one rider for each team point rider class offered at the National Finals.

8508 Saddle Seat Individual Rider Year End Awards

8508.1 Saddle Seat riders will accumulate points as follows toward Year-End awards.

8508.2 Points will be tracked at the Zone and National levels. 1st place – 7 points; 2nd place - 5 points; 3rd place - 4 points; 4th place – 3 points; 5th place – 2 points; and 6th place – 1 point. In case of individual ties for year-end awards within final class standings, tie shall be broken first by a total of 1st place finishes, then 2nd place finishes, then 3rd place finishes-6th place finishes if needed. This method will break ties for both titles and awards. If the riders are still tied after the tally of placings has been done, they will remain tied in title, and a coin toss will determine the award distribution.

8508.3 All Saddle Seat competitions must be held between September 15th and May 15th.

8508.4 Final standings will be published by June 6th for year-end awards.

8509 Saddle Seat Team Year End Awards

8509.1 Saddle Seat teams will accumulate points as follows toward Year-End awards.

8509.2 Points will be tracked at the Zone and National levels. 1st place – 7 points; 2nd place - 5 points; 3rd place - 4 points; 4th place – 3 points; 5th place – 2 points; and 6th place – 1 point. In case of team ties for year-end awards, tie shall be broken first by a total of 1st place finishes, then 2nd place finishes, then by the highest total workout class points. This method shall determine both titles and awards. If the teams are still tied after this method has been applied, then they shall remain tied in title, and a coin toss will determine the award distribution.

8509.3 All Saddle Seat competitions must be held between September 15th and May 15th.

8509.4 Final standings will be published by June 6th for year-end awards.

RULE 9000: SHOW STANDARDS, ETHICS ENFORCEMENT, VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES

9100 Committees and National Steward

Upon approval of the Board of Directors, the President may appoint a National Steward and/or Chair of the Rules and Ethics Committee each of whom must be members in good standing to qualify for the position. These appointed positions sit at the discretion of the President, but may be removed (with or without cause) by a majority vote of the Board of Directors.

9200 Rules and Ethics Committee

9201 The President may appoint members of the Rules and Ethics Committee ("REC"). The REC shall be composed of eight (8) members to serve one year terms starting July 1st. The composition shall be three (3) Hunt Seat representatives, three (3) Western representatives and the IEA President or the President's designee. The President or the President's designee shall be the Chair.

9202 The REC shall be responsible for suggesting changes to the IEA rules, regulations and standards. The REC shall review proposals for rule changes and prepare a report on the practicality and suitability of any proposed change. The Chair of the REC shall present the written rules, regulations and standards change proposals to the Board of Directors who will make the final decision.

9203 The provisions of these rules shall apply to the following persons: exhibitor, coach, rider, show official, show employee, designated representative or member of the family of the above, individual, and member schools, member show and member institution, who act in a manner in violation of the Rules of the IEA or deemed prejudicial to its best interests. Any action in connection with a show in violation of the Rules, by a member of the family of a person participating in the Show, who is described in the previous sentence, may be deemed to have been committed by such person and subject to penalties.

9204 IEA Zones and Regions may not adopt rules that circumvent or abridge established IEA rules.

9205 Non-Protestable Decisions

9205.1 The soundness of a horse or the suitability of a rider or a horse, when determined by a Steward of the Show or by a Judge, is not a violation.

9205.2 A Judge's decision, representing their individual preference, is not a violation of the rules.

9300 Zone Ethics Committee (ZEC)

9301 Composition and Election

9301.1 The Committee shall consist of:

1. The Zone Chair as Chairman, to vote only in case of ties.
2. Five (5) designated coach representatives as defined in IEA Rule 2303 (Coach membership).
3. At least one alternate.
4. Five (5) IEA teams should be represented on ZEC if possible. Any member involved in an alleged violation must be excused and replaced by the alternate. A Vice-Chairman shall be elected if the Chairman is involved in an alleged violation.
5. The National Steward and Associate National Steward shall act as resources to the ZEC aiding in the consistent application of all rules and regulations. They may serve as ad hoc members to any ZEC meeting and be consulted at any point of the review process.

9301.2 The ZEC shall serve for a term of two (2) years.

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9301.3 Elections for the ZEC shall be held on or before the first regular point show of the season.

9302 Jurisdiction

9302.1 The ZEC shall have jurisdiction over all alleged violations of the IEA Rules and Regulations occurring within the Zone.

9302.2 The ZEC shall entertain only formal petitions, appeals or protests written by a coach member, steward, or show official. The petition must be filed with the IEA Membership Secretary who will send it to the Zone Chair and Zone Ethics Committee.

9302.3 The ZEC shall rule on and enforce such violations and penalties as listed in 9500 and 9600. For the sake of organizational consistency, the ZEC will send their recommendation to the National Steward to affirm, modify, or deny. Once approved by the National Steward, the final ruling will be communicated by the ZEC to all related parties. ~~hereunder are described for the violation. A copy of these rulings shall be sent to the National Steward.~~

9303 Judicial Procedure

9303.1 Formal petitions, protests and appeals must be written by a coach member, steward or show official and submitted through the IEA Membership Secretary. The Membership Secretary will immediately forward the petition, protest or appeal on to the Zone Chair who will bring the matter before the Zone Ethics Committee.

9303.2 Formal Petition - Any request submitted in writing to the Zone Chair with respect to a particular cause, including a review of a decision made by a show steward. Petitions relating to events or decisions made at an IEA show must be submitted within ten (10) days of the pertaining show.

9303.3 Formal Protest - A notice of alleged violation must be in writing, submitted through the IEA Membership Secretary and addressed to the Zone Chairman within ten (10) days of discovery and must state the full name and address of the accused and the accuser and contain a complete and definitive statement of the acts which constitute the alleged violation. Precise details regarding a violation of the Rules are necessary.

9303.4 Appeal - Refer to Rule 9303.7.

9303.5 Hearings:

1. Following receipt of a formal protest, the ZEC shall notify the defendant in writing of the charges.
2. The defendant and accuser shall be given at least seven (7) days notice of the date of the hearing.
3. The hearing shall be recorded and a copy thereof forwarded within seven (7) days to the IEA National Steward.
4. To conduct the hearing at least four (4) members of the ZEC must be present.
5. After giving all persons an opportunity to be heard, the ZEC shall in closed session within seven (7) days of the hearing determine if a violation has occurred, and if so, what penalty, if any, should be imposed.
6. To reach a verdict or impose a penalty, at least four (4) members of the ZEC must concur in the verdict and penalty.

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9303.6 Notification of Verdict and Penalty:

The verdict and penalty, if any, shall be set forth in writing by the chairman of the ZEC within seven (7) days of the determination, and sent by certified (or "Fed Ex") mail or return receipt email to the defendant and the accuser. A copy shall also be sent to the National Steward and the President. If within twenty (20) days of certified receipt or return receipt the chairman has received no notice of appeal, a copy of the verdict with penalty, if any, shall be sent to the defendant's team coach or other appropriate team authority.

9303.7 Appeal

- ~~1. If a petitioner, defendant or accuser is not satisfied with the decision of the ZEC, s/he may bring an appeal to the National Steward, or, should they reside in the National Steward's Zone, the Associate National Steward.~~
- ~~2. The appeal shall be made in writing and sent within fourteen (14) days of the verdict's receipt, through the IEA Membership Secretary, who will forward it to the appropriate National Steward, with a copy sent to the Chairman of the ZEC, accompanied by a \$250.00 bond to be returned only if the appeal is sustained.~~
- ~~3. The National Steward may affirm, reverse, or modify the verdict of the ZEC within fourteen (14) days of the appeal's receipt. The National Steward's opinion shall be set forth in writing to the defendant, the accuser, and the Chairman of the ZEC. A copy shall also be sent to the alternate National Steward and the President.~~
4. If the defendant or the accuser is not satisfied with the decision of the ZEC and National Steward, s/he may bring an appeal to the Executive Committee.
5. The appeal shall be made in writing within fourteen (14) days of the verdict's receipt and accompanied by a \$250.00 bond to be returned only if the appeal is sustained. It shall be sent to the IEA Membership Secretary, who will forward it to the President and the Executive Committee with a copy to be sent to the Chairman of the ZEC and the National Steward.
6. The Executive Committee will respond within fourteen (14) days of the appeal's receipt. The Committee may affirm, reverse, or modify the verdict of the ZEC and National Steward. ~~within fourteen (14) days of the appeal's receipt.~~ Its opinion shall be set forth in writing by the National Secretary and sent to the defendant, the accuser, the Chairman of the ZEC, the Board of Directors, and the defendant's team coach or other appropriate team authority. The ruling of the Executive Committee is final.

9304 Extraordinary Procedure

9304.1 In the event that the ZEC upon receipt of written charge determines 1) that the outcome of the hearing could affect eligibility for either a Regional, Zone or National Horse Show and 2) that a hearing upon the notice required cannot be held in sufficient time before such Regional, Zone or National Horse Show to insure that only qualified riders or teams will be able to compete, the ZEC may on a two-thirds vote follow the extraordinary procedure herein.

9304.2 If the ZEC determines that the extraordinary procedure is necessary it shall follow all procedures outlined in Judicial Procedure except all communications shall be carried out as soon as possible by telephone.

9304.3 The date of the hearing must be no less than twenty-four (24) hours after notification.

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9305 Non-cooperation

In the event that a member fails to cooperate with the ZEC, the ZEC by a vote of at least four (4) members shall forthwith suspend said member until the member renders the cooperation required.

9306 Nationals Standards and Ethics Committee:

The Nationals Standards and Ethics Committee shall be comprised of the IEA Executive Committee.

9307 Procedure

9307.1 Procedure shall be as abbreviated as necessary to resolve a dispute while still maintaining fairness to all parties.

9307.2 If owing to a lack of pertinent information, all or any portion of a dispute cannot be resolved at a horse show, the accused may continue with the understanding that any point tallies and/or winnings may be forfeited at a later time.

9307.3 Notification and appeal shall be the same as outlined in Judicial Procedure.

9308 Reciprocity

On receipt of official notice that disciplinary action has been taken by a Humane Society or Court of Law against a person for an act which may be a violation of Association Rules, an officer of this Association may make a charge against such person to his Zone Ethics Committee and after a hearing of such disciplined person under the provision of the Rules, may take such action as it deems in its own best interest.

9400 National Steward

9401 The National Steward shall be responsible for the interpretation of all rules, regulations and standards. Appeals can only be filed by IEA coaches. Coaches must file appeals for their teams and on behalf of individual riders.

9402 The National Steward serves on the Rules and Ethics Committee and is charged with being knowledgeable of all rules, regulations and standards as set forth by the Board of Directors.

9403 The National Steward must be over twenty-one (21) years of age and must be recommended by the Board of Directors. Each term of office shall run for two (2) years.

9404 The President or President Elect will serve as Associate National Steward and will have jurisdiction in the National Steward's zone and in any matters where there may be a conflict of interest for the National Steward.

9405 All decisions made by the National Steward and Associate National Steward are final **except through 9303.7.**

9406 All opinions or rulings by the National Stewards shall be reduced to writing and copies forwarded to the Executive Director, Executive Committee and all other interested persons.

9500 Individual Violations and Penalties

9501 Violations - An individual violation is any of the following acts committed by a rider, contributing or coach member:

1. Violation of any IEA Rule or Regulation.

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2. Penalization by the Humane Society or Court of Law for violation of Association Rules.
3. Acting, or inciting or permitting another person to act, in a manner contrary to the IEA Rules and Regulations, or in a manner deemed improper, unethical, dishonest, unsportsmanlike, intemperate or prejudicial to the best interest of IEA.
4. Any act committed or remark made in connection with a show, considered offensive and/or made with intent to influence or cast aspersions on the character or integrity of the judging; approaching a judge before or after a decision without first obtaining permission from the show committee or steward; inspection of a judge's card without show management's permission.
5. Failure of a judge or steward to perform his duties at a show in accordance with the Rules.
6. Filing of an inaccurate membership application.
7. Failure of an exhibitor or his/her representative to sign the entry blank of a show in which he/she competes.
8. Physical assault upon a person and/or cruelty to a horse.
9. Failure to obey any penalty imposed by IEA.

9502 Penalties - If found guilty of any of the above violations, penalties for an individual shall be limited to the following:

1. Probation shall be listed under the defendant's name in the Secretary's Record of Penalties. If found guilty of a further violation, the defendant shall be subject to a heavier penalty than for a first offense.
2. Suspension of such person or institution for any period from showing. A suspended person or institution is forbidden for the time specified in the sentence to hold or exercise a position, committee or office in IEA or in any Show, and is excluded from all show grounds during Shows, as an exhibitor, participant or spectator.
3. Expulsion from all recognized Shows.
4. Suspension or expulsion from membership in IEA.
5. Forfeiture of trophies, ribbons, and points won in connection with the offense committed.
6. Suspension from office as Steward, Judge or Show Official.
7. Fine.
8. Censure.
9. Removal from position, committee or office.

9503 Communication of Individual Violations & Penalties

All individual violations & penalties will be communicated to those involved via the primary member email contact on file, the coach member, the region chair, and the zone chair. Upon receipt of the communication, the zone chair will notify the Membership Office, who will update the data base to reflect individual and/or team eligibility.

9600 Show Violations and Penalties

9601 An EHC, host, co-host or host school may be subject to penalty by the ZEC, Executive Committee or National Steward for violations of the Rules in the conduct of its show.

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9602 Violations shall include, but are not limited to, the following:

9602.1 Failure to:

1. Conduct a show in accordance with IEA Rules.
2. Use standard specifications for classes.
3. Print the most current IEA indemnification statement and deadlines on each entry blank.
4. Secure the signature of the (1) designated **coach representatives, parent and/or guardian** on each entry blank, and (2) schooling horse rider on the proper waiver form.
5. Provide ambulance on the show grounds or on call, plus qualified medical personnel on the grounds for the scheduled performance as defined in Rule 6102.
6. Timely pay its indebtedness to the IEA.
7. Pay other indebtedness within thirty (30) days.
8. **Submit an Official Show Program and results, the IEA Show Report, copies of entry forms, judge's cards, point rider forms, team competition results, schooling rider waivers (if applicable) and show fees (\$4.00 per entry per class) to the IEA Membership Office within fourteen (14) days after the close of the show. File marked catalogues.**
9. Report the disqualification of a person at the show.
10. Present correct Hunt Seat Equitation courses or Western patterns.
11. Honor written contracts with judges, stewards, or other show officials and employees.
12. Conduct a competition day within a twelve (12) hour period from start of schooling to conclusion of last class.
13. Provide appropriate number of horses and alternates in the draw as recommended in the show hosting guidelines the for the accepted number of entries.
14. **Secure IEA mandated event insurance through Equisure.**

9602.2 The use of judges in divisions in which they have not been enrolled without obtaining in advance the required general permission.

9602.3 The use of non-qualified stewards.

9602.4 The listing of a judge or steward in the prize list or catalogue before the invitation to serve has been accepted.

9602.5 Permitting persons or institutions not in good standing to participate in any manner.

9602.6 Permitting acts that are improper, intemperate, dishonest, unsportsmanlike or contrary to the Rules and Regulations of IEA.

9603 An EHC, host, and/or co-host guilty of a violation shall be subject to penalty of one or more of the following:

9603.1 Fine and/or suspension may be levied proportionate to the violation.

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9603.2 If found guilty of a further violation, the EHC, host, and/or co-host shall be liable to a heavier penalty than for a first offense, including suspension for any period from the list of approved shows including National Finals and/or Expulsion from membership in IEA.

9603.3 A Show Supervisor may be assigned (expenses to be covered by EHC, host, and/or co-host) by the Zone Chair for future competition.

9603.4 Additional penalties as listed in Rule 9502 may also be applied if applicable.

9604 Communication of Show Violations & Penalties

All show violations & penalties will be communicated to the EHC, the Co-Hosts, the EHF, the Show Secretary via the primary member email contact on file, the Region Chair, and the Zone Chair. Upon receipt of the communication, the Zone Chair will notify the National Office who will update the data base to reflect individual and/or team eligibility.

9700 Reciprocity

Upon receipt of appropriate notice that disciplinary action has been taken by a Humane Society or court of law against a person for an act which may be a violation of these IEA Rules and Regulations, an officer of IEA may make a charge against such person to the REC and after a hearing of such disciplined person under the provision of the Rules, may take such action as it deems in its own best interest.

IEA SOCIAL MEDIA POLICY

The Interscholastic Equestrian Association (IEA) recognizes the importance of the Internet in shaping public thinking about our organization and our current and future events and potential services. We also recognize the importance of our members, families, coaches, trainers, sponsors, volunteers, employees, vendors, contributors and friends joining together to have communication about the IEA, its events, activities and subjects related to equestrian sport. The IEA is committed to supporting honest, transparent and knowledgeable dialogue on the Internet through social media in a manner that is befitting the organization and promotes good sportsmanship.

The official IEA presence on Social Media

The IEA maintains several Facebook pages and groups, Twitter accounts, as well as accounts on YouTube, Tumblr, Pinterest and other sites.

The IEA will, from time-to-time, conduct contests, take surveys and endorse Zone, team and sponsor activities through social media.

The IEA encourages members, families, coaches, trainers, sponsors, volunteers, employees, vendors, contributors and friends to create communication among all groups through social media.

It is important to note: All sites are monitored multiple times throughout the day 24/7. Any post deemed inappropriate will be deleted. The person who originates an improper post will be contacted and advised not to misrepresent the IEA or craft unsuitable messages in the future. Should another occurrence happen, the originator would be blocked from all IEA social media sites. Should the problem persist, the IEA will, within its rights, cancel the person's membership and participation in the IEA.

The IEA Marketing Director manages all official social media accounts with support from the Membership Marketing Director, under the guidance of the Executive Director. The Marketing Director is responsible for the security of passwords and upkeep of these accounts. The Marketing Director grants access to other IEA staff to administer groups on the platforms and to post content.

Simple Guide to Postings:

Think of newscast, your mother and your boss

Don't post anything online-including demonstrative and colloquial language- that you wouldn't be comfortable seeing quoted on a newscast, being asked about by your mother or having to justify to your boss.

Be safe.

There are creeps online just like in the real world. Don't publicly post anything you wouldn't tell a stranger on the street. Opinions and ideas belong in a public forum; your last name, passwords or phone numbers do not. Use only your first name and last initial while blogging.

Comment in correct tone:

The IEA, like any organization, always strives to improve its operations so competitions remain among the best in equestrian sport. No matter the subject, every post must demonstrate proper intent and be written with good sportsmanship in mind. All comments should be crafted with appropriate tone and prose. Please note: Social media is not the forum for filing complaints or criticisms about IEA staff, rules, officials, or events. Serious concerns and recommendations for rule or policy changes should be expressed through procedures outlined in Rule 9000 of the IEA Rulebook. The IEA management attempts to communicate through all methods in a transparent manner, and social media is no exception.

Confidentiality and Security:

Do not post confidential or proprietary information about the IEA or any individual or yourself on social media. Do not collect sensitive information—such as phone numbers, student ID numbers, Social Security numbers, payment information, etc.—via social media, as those are not secure channels.

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
